





Madison area officials are offered history and cultural understanding of Ho-Chunk people

Never before had representatives of the Ho-Chunk Nation and city of Madison officials gotten together to have a clearer understanding of each other.

Until now.

Daniel Brown, Executive Manager of Ho-Chunk Gaming – Madison, decided to invite city officials to learn more about the Ho-Chunk people, their culture and history.

That meeting took place on Thursday, April 23, at Lussier Family Center in Madison.

“Our purpose for this event is to acclimate officials to the Ho-Chunk Nation, particularly Madison Ho-Chunk,” Brown said. “Our intent is very straightforward, we want to develop and maintain good relations with the public sector of Madison. In order for them to better understand us, they need to get to know us.”

Brown believes he has a greater mission than just managing the casino.

“I have been managing this property for about two years, and it has been my mission to raise our Ho-Chunk profile in this community.”

Ho-Chunk Nation Municipal Relations Coordinator Missy Tracy also was one of the organizers of the event. The Sanford WhiteEagle Legion Post 556 provided the presentation of the colors and the Wisconsin Dells Singers provided the music.

“The purpose of the meeting was to develop a relationship with city officials - to open the lines of communication,” she said. “We’re finally getting recognized as a sovereign nation and a leader in the Madison community.”

Tracy explained that the Madison area is named Teejop by the Ho-Chunk, with Tee meaning lake and jop meaning four, together meaning the area of four lakes.

She provided a history of the Ho-Chunk people from the early days when they were known as effigy mound builders from 700 to 1100 A.D. through the white settlement era and treaty issuance and removal of Ho-Chunk people to distant lands.

“Government doesn’t grant sovereignty – we always had it. That’s why I provided our history up to the present day,” Tracy said. “We’re not just another business. We have our own present, just as the United States has President Obama, we have our president. We’re above any state or city – we are a nation. Most people don’t know that.”

University of Wisconsin - Madison Law Professor Richard Monette, member of the Turtle Mountain Band of Chippewa, gave a presentation about tribal sovereignty.

Monette referred to Public Law 280 in 1983, which delegates certain powers over Indian Country.

“It took an act of Congress to pass this law, which subjects the internal affairs of reservations. They have jurisdiction over criminal offenses and civil causes of action,” he said.

And then the IGRA came into being in 1988, which requires a gaming compact for

Class III gaming, but none for Class I or II. It requires government approval for post -1988 land acquisition for gaming.

“We used to have that right, but Congress took that away,” Monette said. “Most of laws are designed to separate people from their wealth. This is the hand the Ho-Chunk Nation has been dealt – they’re just playing it.”

Monette’s main point that that government does not issue right to people – it only takes rights away.

“The Ho-Chunk Nation was always a sovereign nation. It just took the government a while to recognize that,” he said.

Monette offered a quote from a poetic tale “The Little Prince.”

“Kings do not own – they reign over. It is a very different matter,” the quote read.

Invited to the event were Dane County Executive Joe Parisi, Dane County Supervisors, Madison Mayor Paul Soglin, the Madison City Common Council members, Monona Mayor Bob Miller,

and minority leaders from the area.

Of 80 or so invited, approximately 40 people were in attendance, including Mayor Bob Miller, many Madison alderpersons, a Dane County supervisor, and leaders of minority groups in Madison.

“I invited them to educate the public sector and educate the people of Madison about the Ho-Chunk people,” Tracy said. “I didn’t want Madison to look on us as a casino or business. We want them to know who we are – a sovereign nation that supports the community. “People think we have all those casinos. But we take care of our people and the community,” she said. “We let them know who we are and the history of the people.”

The whole effort is the brainchild of Daniel Brown, Tracy said.

“It was his vision. He was the one who had this vision,” she said. “It was his initiative. He went and made it happen.”

Likewise, Brown has high

praise for Tracy for her efforts.

“I created a position last year (Municipal Relations Coordinator), and I filled it with a Ho-Chunk Tribal member, Missy Tracy, and

In the morning, the children of the Mission and Sandpilot Head Start programs came to the atrium and were provided with activities from the staff of the Ho-Chunk Department of Natural Resources Department.

Children were able to swish their hands through an aquatic environment with minnows, use crayons to create leaf rubbings, learn about fire-fighting in the grasslands and forests, and touch and learn about creatures on the planet from Dennis "Dino" Tlachac, environmental educator with Nature's Niche LLC, Stevens Point.

Tlachac gave a presentation to the public later in the afternoon, allowing people to learn about various insects, mammals, reptiles and birds of local and tropical regions on Earth.

Organized search for Cloud produces no evidence of whereabouts

Professional searchers took to the forest on Saturday, April 18, in hopes of finding some kind of clue, some evidence, of the whereabouts of Gene Cloud Jr.

The group was the Rapid Search and Rescue, combination of the best searchers from throughout the state.

"I think it's good. I'm trying to get some closure," said Simone Zane, mother of Gene

Cloud Jr. "I appreciate everything they're doing."

Volunteers were not allowed to help in the search because the team uses specific methods and those methods are a trained skill, said Sherri Jo Lucas, president and incident commander of Rapid Search and Rescue.

"These are people from teams all over Wisconsin. They are the best of the best and are named 'Task Force 1.'"

The people joining forces are from the Neenah Headwaters K-9 Search and Rescue, Neenah; Valley Mounted Volunteers Inc., Appleton; K-9 Emergency Response Team, Menasha; K-9 SOS, Madison area; and the Rapid Search and Rescue from Wisconsin Rapids.

They are solely funded with donations and members paying their own way.

"We have brat fries, a bowling tournament once a year and donations from the public," she said. "And many times, like now, the hosts pay for hotel and food for the day."

Searchers need to undergo intensive training before they can join in any of the team search activities, Lucas said. Besides the initial training, they are required to attend training sessions once a year. The training consists of classroom lessons, then outdoor practical exercises and tests.

"We were dropped into the middle of the Chequamegon

Forest in northern Wisconsin and were required to find two child dummies," she said. "It wasn't easy. We started at 8 in the morning and didn't find the second dummy until 1:30 the next morning."

Besides the training, the actual work is rigorous and demanding in several ways.

"It's not for anyone who wants to make sure they spend Christmas with the family," Lucas said. "And it's not for anyone who doesn't want to spend money out of their own pocket."

The search team was requested by Jackson County Chief Deputy Mark Moan, who had contacted Chuck Keuhn, top instructor and president of the Headwaters K-9 Search and Rescue.

One of the searchers was Bruce LaMere, a Ho-Chunk member who is originally from the Wittenberg area and who now lives near Tomahawk.

"I joined the team in March. As far as I know, I am the only Native member in the search team," LaMere said. "I was trained in map and compass search methods. I've been on independent searches in Minnesota and northern Wisconsin. We search for people but sometimes we search for evidence, such as clothing or weapons."

The methods they use are precise and can be documented so the results can be reviewed later, Lucas said. She explained their methods

of conducting a search.

"The missions are drawn out ahead of time and mapped out," she said. "Each of the team members is carrying a GPS, which tracks every move they make. Later, when they come back, we plug their GPSs into a computer and it shows where they went."

By looking at a map on the computer screen, showing the paths they took, they can see what ground was covered and what needs to be looked at yet.


"Then, in a debriefing, we discuss what they saw," Lucas said. "If there is something that needs re-examination, we go back and look again."

There are two types of searches, she said. The first is when they are looking for someone who recently disap-

peared, such as a young child. In those cases, they often cover ground by lining up, walking in a straight line and sweeping an entire area. The second type is the one currently used for Gene Cloud Jr., where a larger area needs to be covered and the trail is cold. Then they use multiple teams with GPS units who are assigned certain areas.

Lucas emphasizes that the difference between their team and other searchers is their high level of training. Ho-Chunk Boxers featured on Baraboo Boys and Girls Club Fight Night

The Baraboo Boys and Girls Club's two year old boxing program held its third fight night at the Baraboo Civic Center to showcase the participants boxing prowess. On April 17, the Boys and Girls Club Fight Night featured two Ho-Chunk tribal members: Anthony "A-Train" Acevedo and Destina "Little Bear" Warner.

The two fighters are among the founding group of the boxing program called the

Original 8. The founding group of fighters received and wear an Original 8 patch on their fight gear.

Boys and Girls Club Program Director Will Sheckel started the boxing program after he learned the benefits of boxing as a college student. "Boxing helped me in all areas of my life. That's why I advocated for the start of the boxing program for the kids," said Sheckel.

"This is our third fight night. We started out with no contact, then we got approved for contact sparring. Our boxers will get to show off their training and share the program with the community."

The fighters go for three 2 minute rounds on a padded floor. They wear protective head gear, a mouth guard, and boxing gloves.

"A-Train" Acevedo entered the ring for his first live action bout. Previous fight nights, he opted out of the action. Acevedo went 2-0 on the night.

In his first bout, he was out-sized, but used his footwork and combination punches to best his opponent.

In his second bout, he faced a more experienced fighter, but again, his quick feet and hands helped him secure the win. Acevedo's hand speed

cause his opponent to hyperventilate and concede the match.

Destina "Little Bear" Warner entered the night with an unblemished record. When asked what she enjoys most about the sport she responded, "I like the feeling I get when I win a fight."

Little Bear's first bout was labelled a sparring match as the other fighter was pushed to her physical limits in her first bout of the night. Warner urged her, "C'mon! Fight me!"

Next it was on to Little Bear's co-main event fight where she wanted to maintain her perfect record. Warner and her opponent went toe-to-toe for all six minutes of the 3 round fight. They traded power punches that put their head gear to use. Warner stood right in front of her opponent and brought the fight to her. In the end, "Little Bear" Warner was outpointed on the judges' scorecards and faced her first defeat.

"They put their heart into it tonight. We'll keep going. After this night, we'll be looking to our next fight night and the boxers will get back into the gym," said Sheckel.

The program meets for an hour on Tuesdays and Thursdays in the Civic Center gym.

Two Ho-Chunk law enforcement students graduate from Western Tech

With a graduation ceremony on Thursday, April 16, Brandon LaMere and Nicole Thunder have embarked on new journeys in their lives.

They graduated from Police Academy training at Western Technical College, an achievement marked with a ceremony at the Lunda Center at the WTC Campus in La Crosse.

For Brandon, his interest in Law Enforcement begins and ends with his love for dogs. Some people might not understand the connection between dogs and police work, but it makes perfect sense, he said.

"I went to the Police Acad-

emy because I have a long-term goal of being a K-9 handler in law enforcement," he said. "It's a great value for law enforcement and for the community. Plus, I am from the Bear Clan, which is a protector, so it fits right in with my thoughts."

He's always had a great passion for dogs and he presently owns four dogs. His favorite breeds are German shepherd and Belgian Malinois, which are known for their training and scenting abilities.

Brandon is the son of Alex LaMere and Rose Campton and is a graduate of Viroqua High School.

"My plans are to eventually gain a patrol position with the Vernon County Sheriff's Department or the Viroqua Police Department," he said. "I would like to eventually work on K-9 patrol."

Brandon believes he can achieve his goals by first establishing a training kennel and then gain respect within the law enforcement community.

"There are reasons for not using private dog owners for law enforcement, such as a liability issue," Brandon said. "Also, they like to have dogs with handlers who know more of the law enforcement needs – the working needs."

He has been training working dogs since 2003 and he currently is training one of his own dogs for work.

"Hopefully I'll be able to work with a patrol dog," he said.

There presently is a bloodhound that helps out in certain situations in the county. Brandon helped start that dog in law enforcement training and 18 months ago it was certified for use with the police force.

He is grateful for the opportunity to start down the path of achieving his lifelong career dreams.

"The Ho-Chunk Nation has helped me out with education," he said. "Someday I would like to repay that gesture by handling a dog and working for the Ho-Chunk Police Department."

Nicole Thunder also graduated from Western Technical College.

"I always wanted to be involved with law enforcement – even when I was 12 years old," she said. "It's my calling – my comfort zone."

Nicole is the daughter of Gordon and Beverly Thunder. She started her education in law enforcement in 1999, but the little things in life got in the way. She got a job, but she was determined to finish her education.

"It's always been my destination," she said. Most recently, Nicole was the Motor Vehicle Injury Prevention Coordinator with the Ho-Chunk Nation Health Department.

"It was my connection with law enforcement," she said. "I would teach people about the use of seat belts, the need to refrain from texting while driving and prevention of drunk driving."

About a year and a half ago, Nicole resumed attending Police Academy training at Western Technical College, while continuing to work a 40-hour week and also taking care of her four children.

"I had orientation (for classes) the day before I gave birth to my youngest child," she said.

Then, last August, she was hired by the Ho-Chunk Police Department and began patrol with Police Officer Zack Quackenbush. Being divided into three different activities wasn't easy, but she was de-

termined to make it work.

"I drank a lot of coffee," she said.

And now that she has completed her training, she plans to be sworn-in sometime in June to become a fulltime officer. She wants others to know that they can reach their objectives if they put forth the effort.

"My dedication proves that you can still achieve what you want," Nicole said. "No matter your age, you can still obtain education to complete your goals."

New Programs and Emphasis Options Ready for CMN Students in Fall 2015



Applications are now open at the College of Menominee Nation for Fall Semester 2015 and for new programs including an Associate Degree in Environmental Engineering Technology.

The College's academic array includes three Bachelor's Degree programs, with a fourth and fifth in planning stages for probable introduction in 2016. CMN's established baccalaureate majors prepare students for teacher licensure at the Early Childhood/Middle Childhood Education levels, and for professional work requiring degrees in Public Administration or Business Administration. For the coming Fall Semester, the College's B.S. in Business continues to offer an emphasis in Management and adds an emphasis area in Accounting.

"We have been strong in professional studies with education and administration majors," says CMN President Verna Fowler. "As we look to the future, we see careers opening up for graduates with Bachelor's Degrees in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields. Current and prospective students are also interested in traditional liberal studies that can help them prepare for jobs

in areas such as human services and broad-field communications. Degree programs that address those areas are still on the drawing board, but certainly look promising."

Newest Major: Environmental Engineering

Current and new students don't have to wait for the new Environmental Engineering Technology program, a two-year offering that begins in Fall 2015 and leads to an Associate of Applied Sciences Degree at CMN. CMN graduates will have automatic transfer to four-year environmental engineering technician programs at UW-Green Bay and UW Oshkosh. The CMN credits will also apply at any UW campus for baccalaureate offerings in Mechanical Engineering, Electrical Engineering or related majors.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics describes environmental engineering technicians as workers who test, operate and modify equipment used to prevent or clean up environmental pollution, or work to mitigate sources of pollution. The Bureau sees the field as a faster-than-average growth occupation with an 18 percent increase between 2012 and 2022. One predicted boost to the field will come as agen-

cies and municipalities focus on more efficient water use and wastewater treatment.

Program Alignments Address Market

National and regional issues are also informing the College's on-going program reviews and changes.

A downward trend in enrollment peaked in 2013 for college and university enrollments across the U.S. and in 2014 for the College of Menominee Nation.

"Like higher education in general, we enjoyed an enrollment bubble for several years," says President Fowler. "When the national economy declined, more people returned to school to add credentials, prepare for new career fields and in general become more marketable. As employment has opened up, fewer are choosing to pursue studies. It is certainly part of the long-standing cycle in higher education of several years up and then a leveling or decline. You can see it in the University of Wisconsin System and you can see it here."

For CMN, the bubble was reflected in an increase of about 21% in enrollment between Fall 2008 and Fall 2012. Enrollment began

returning to earlier levels in 2013 and has continued into the current academic year, with Spring 2015 numbers at approximately 500 students.

CMN has also closely watched information from the U.S. Department of Education on the subject of gainful employment. DOE concerns have mostly focused on whether the proliferation of for-profit colleges that use federal student aid dollars are meeting their promises of preparing students for paid work in recognized occupations. "We are a not-for-profit college, but we have always scrutinized our offerings from a job market perspective," Fowler says. "It is a particular challenge in an economically depressed area where there are fewer job opportunities in general, but we embrace the obligation and new gainful employment rules, nonetheless."

Initiatives Right Size, Tuition Unchanged

The College is using a variety of initiatives to off-set the revenue declines attendant with lower enrollment and to sustain course offerings and services for its students.

Leadership has been re-aligning some operations, right-sizing staff numbers,

and reviewing the academic and technical program array.

"It was especially painful to reduce staff positions," President Fowler says, "but we still remain a strong community employer with nearly 175 employees."

Of greatest interest to students and parents is the CMN Board of Trustees' decision to hold tuition at \$250 a credit hour, which has been the rate since Fall 2012, and to assure that no programs changes prohibit students from completing their chosen degree or diploma requirements. Fees are being adjusted in some science-based and technology-intensive programs having high support costs, but overall CMN's student fees remain significantly lower than at most other institutions.

Fall Semester 2015 begins on Aug. 17 with degree or diploma offerings in 16 majors, including new and reconfigured areas of study. The College offers free, online application at www.menominee.edu and encourages prospective and continuing students to contact the CMN Financial Aid Office early to inquire about scholarships and complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Supervisory management training - HCN Essentials of Supervision

The first four weeks Western Technical College facilitated the teaching of supervisory management principles (Essentials of Supervision), with the fifth week the Department of Personnel staff facilitated their portion on issues relating to the supervisory handbook and the Employment Relations Act. Twenty-four tribal employees from Heritage Preservation, Language, Personnel, Labor, Office of the President and Information Technology Departments participated. This supervisory training will be again available for other government directors, managers and supervisors during the next fiscal year.

Ho-Chunk Nation DNR/Lands/BIA have prescribed burn at Badger Army Ammunitions Plant

The Ho-Chunk Nation DNR/Lands Department and the BIA completed a controlled prescribed burn at the Badger Army Ammunition Plant on Thursday, April 23, 2015. Prescribed burns are a land management practice that will help eliminate invasive species and enhance the native plant community. The HCN DNR/Lands Department complete prescribed burns in the late spring. They are a preventative measure for HCN Lands.



From the OFFICE OF TRIBAL ENROLLMENT

Annual Address Verification forms (AVF) will be mailed in the first week of June 2015. The AVF will be mailed to the address on record in the Enrollment office.

All 2015 AVF's must be date stamped in by 4:30pm on July 17, 2015 in order to receive your August 1, 2015 Per Capita Distribution check. **We DO NOT ACCEPT COPIES, FAXES OR EMAIL ATTACHEMENTS FOR THE ANNUAL AVF.**

Always update your address as needed by submitting a Change of Address (COA) form to the Enrollment Office. This will assure your AVF is mailed to the correct address. The COA form can be found on the Nations website, follow the Enrollment forms link.

NOTICE: For Wisconsin Residents, the COA form is revised to include the **County and Tribal Community** (i.e.; *Blue Wing Village, Chakh Hah Chee, Ho-Chunk Village, etc.*) that you live in. It is very important that you include this information on the form when you change your address with the Enrollment Office. If you do not specify your County and Community, the Office of Tribal Enrollment will default to the information you provided on your latest AVF.

The Tribal Community designation will also be added to the AVF. **If you do not specify the County and Community that you reside on your AVF, it will be considered incomplete and returned to you.**

REMINDER: For voting purposes your physical address is used to determine the district you are eligible to vote in. You must be a resident of that District ninety (90) days prior to the date of a General Primary, Primary or Special Election to vote for candidates in that District.

FOR FUTURE REFERENCE: You must have your COA's date stamped by 4:30 pm on the 15th of each month in order to be on the Mid-Month Per Capita check Run.

Healthy food makes better choices available at House of Wellness

When it comes to healthy eating, sometimes the right food just isn't available.

Amy DeLong and her co-workers at the House of Wellness in Baraboo wanted to eat healthy, but to do so was rather difficult. Healthy food wasn't within driving distance at noon, given the half-hour break they were given. There were no fresh fruits and vegetables in the area, she said.

So, DeLong and a handful of her co-workers set about changing that.

The result was evident on Tuesday, April 28, in the food court area of the House of Wellness.

Unveiled as a new vending machine with healthy food choices. The curtain was drawn back and then employees and visitors could see the newest addi-

tion to the House of Wellness.

"We are happy to have this available," DeLong said.

Selections include cottage cheese and peaches, chef salad, carrots, broccoli and cauliflower, pretzels, string cheese, apples, oranges, hard-boiled eggs, yogurt, milk, tuna salad, parfait.

The project was possible through The Spirit of Eagles grant, nearly \$6,000, of which DeLong wrote the grant proposal.

Many of the selections actually cost more than the price being offered to the public. For instance, a salad might be sold for \$1.50 when it actually costs \$2.50. The lower price is offered because the grant provides money to make up the difference.

The kitchen isn't working, so we sent out a survey in December 2012 to the approximately 150 employees at the House of Wellness to see if they would support the kitchen operation of healthy meals for breakfast and lunch.


"It was unanimous," DeLong said. "Yes, they would buy from the kitchen and even pay more to suppose the effort."

Before the kitchen would be opened, DeLong wanted to see the popularity of the healthy food vending machine. Based on the popularity of the new food options, a decision to open the kitchen will be made.

"We'll see how it goes," DeLong said. "We'll do another survey in two months."

The road to getting the machine wasn't an easy one, even after the grant was approved. Next they had to find a vender to supply the machine and the food.

"The nearest supplier is in Madison

and they didn't want to make the trip up here for just one machine," DeLong said. "So, we had to go through the Business Department to get the casino to have similar vending machines."

Business Department did approve that measure and vending machines from the same supplier will have vending machines in the casino, the hotel and the break rooms, she said.
