Siga Funmaker Community Center opens with ribbon-cutting ceremony

Many people in the Wittenberg area agree that Georgiann "Siga" Funmaker was a pillar in the community. She helped develop and form many of the institutions and programs built around the word "community."

Because of the deep respect of her peers, on Thursday, Feb. 16, a new community center was christened in her name.

Members of the community, young, old and between, gathered together to cut the ribbon as a symbolic beginning to the Siga Funmaker Community Center on Radke Road near Wittenberg.

Siga Funmaker's daughter, Lanette Walker led the cutting of the ribbon, which involved everyone present. People stood along the sidewalk in front of the building, grasping the ribbon in one hand and a pair of scissors in the other.

"Most of you who knew my mother, knew that she was about all of us – not just about some of us. She would want everybody to be included in the ribbon-cutting ceremony."

When given the word, all partici-

pants cut their section of the ribbon.

Before the cutting of the ribbon, Ho-Chunk President Wilfrid Cleveland and Vice President Darren Brinegar spoke before the crowd.

President Cleveland provided a welcome and stated how the smiles and good feelings present at the ceremony offer a good beginning that will be sustained in years to come.

Vice President Darren Brinegar said that the process of constructing a community center was talked about and dreamed about for many years and it has finally become reality.

"I'm proud to be part of the process of having this community building. Siga Funmaker Community Center – D3, or what I like to call as 'God's Country,'" Brinegar said.

Brinegar acknowledged individuals to make the community center come true. He thanked former President Jon Greendeer and his administration for laying the foundation that started this project; President Wilfrid Cleveland and his administration for getting this project completed.

"Also, I want to thank two past leaders, for their hard work, desire, determination, and dedication to our Ho-Chunk Nation: former legislators and their families of the late Dallas Whitewing and former Vice President

Heather Cloud," Brinegar said. "This happened through our desire to have this the center for our community."

Whitewing, Cloud and himself worked closely with the Shawano County Board and asked them to support our trust application, he said.

"In our meetings and planning, we were successful. Shawano County withdrew their opposition for the fee to trust for this property. I just want to say thank you. It's been an honor to be a part of this whole process. And it's a fantastic building," he said.

Tours of the building were given, followed by a meal in the gymnasium and the Wasira Show.

The \$2.6 million facility was financed with NPD funds.

The building is near the other Ho-Chunk buildings, such as the Tribal Aging Unit and the Head Start facilities, and just down the road from Ho-Chunk Gaming-Wittenberg.

"Our family is honored to have the new community center named for her. Thank you to the people of the Potch-Chee-Nunk community for the kind thought and all those who worked hard to accomplish this for the people, not only for our community, but for Mauston and Madison communities as well," Walker said.

Groundbreaking for the fa-

cility took place in Fall 2015 and it was completed in January this year. It opened for use on February 10.

The center is the new home to Youth Services, having been in an older building for a number of years. Half the building is for use by Youth Services and the other half is to be used by the community for various functions.

Besides the facility having specific rooms for the Youth Services, the building has a large gymnasium, two large community rooms on either side of a large kitchen, a conference room, an exercise fitness room and an entryway with front desk. Radiant floor heating is used throughout the building.

The parking lot has elder and handicap parking and a drop-off and loading zone for youth. Landscaping will be completed in spring after the ground thaws.

A new Head Start building is planned to be connected to the end of the Community

Center. Construction for the Head Start building will begin in April and is planned to be finished and ready for the school year in the fall. That building will be funded by an Indian Community Development Block Grant.

General Council can oversee enrollment and cultural responsibility

While reading through our Ho-Chunk Nation Codes and Constitution, one question popped into my mind: Why does the Executive branch of the Ho-Chunk Nation government oversee the Enrollment process? I thought the General Council branch ought to oversee who enters its ranks.

My view of the Ho-Chunk Nation Constitution is that the power is always in the hands of the people through the General Council branch. The people then authorize the other branches to complete a tasks on their behalf.

In that line of thinking, the General Council branch is the parent of organization, while the other branches are the children. The parents must teach and rear their children.

To solidify and further establish the General Council branch beyond holding one annual meeting, I feel the General Council could take back authority and handle the Enrollment process through a passage of a resolution.

Does the General Council branch exist only to organize and conduct one annual meeting per year? There should be more to this, what I consider, most powerful branch of our government.

The General Council Agency was dissolved at last year's annual meeting. This

resolution should have been considered unconstitutional since the General Council Agency is named in the Ho-Chunk Nation Constitution as the agency authorized to accomplish tasks mandated by the General Council.

The legislature subsequently passed the Office of General Council Establishment and Organization Act on Jan. 19, 2017.

The constitution also say the Legislature shall maintain one official roll of all tribal members.

Why is the tendency to get rid of things instead of improving what exists to make it better? Solidifying and establishing the General Council branch is an opportunity to learn, grow, and improve our government. Let's do that.

There are a handful of Ho-Chunks who relinquished their Winnebago of Nebraska membership, but missed the chance to enroll as Ho-Chunk Nation members before the policy changed. For all we know, they aren't enrolled anywhere.

A switch of enrollment from the Executive to General Council could benefit these Ho-Chunk by affording them time to enroll under new procedures or time period during such a switch would occur.

We could require a complete DNA testing of all Ho-Chunk members to eliminate

any fraudulently enrolled members during such a transfer.

We could also overhaul the enrollment code to be culturally-based by only allowing paternal enrollment.

Are we needing or desperate for more tribal members?

Most importantly, it seems to be more common for tribal members to become immersed in the per cap culture versus Ho-Chunk culture. Enrollment doesn't address culture or members' responsibility to contribute to the perpetuation of culture.

Tribal members filling out their address verification form are asked to fill in the space for Ho-Chunk name and begin to wonder how and where to get one. They ask at the Ho-Chunk government offices and may get referred to the Traditional Court, who are the clan leaders.

Some would agree that it's a familial, and not a government, responsibility. Naming ceremonies include prayer and a sacrifice of time, energy, and resources.

I talked about this trend with a relative who said, "Well, maybe it's not for them." I thought she'd be more supportive of Ho-Chunk tribal members wanting to get involved in their culture.

Is the per cap culture prevailing over the Ho-Chunk culture? It seems so.

That response does put things in perspective though. There is a struggle against the effects of assimilation on our Ho-Chunk culture. Historical trauma is real, but must be ad-

ressed and overcome.

Deterioration of the Ho-Chunk family unit seems to be a result of not adhering to our cultural teaching and ways. Perhaps a new direction in enrollment could help usher in a cultural renewal.

A Marine Corps brother of mine, who was raised by natives in Montana, once told me, "WhiteEagle, remember

the bloodline."

Why did a non-native guy from Montana understand the importance marrying or procreating within the tribe versus being in an interracial marriage or relationship?

The General Council branch ought to address cultural responsibility within the enrollment process.

Greetings Tribal Members,

The Ho-Chunk Nation Legislature has been busy at work. We have the completed Tribal Census data.

The Ho-Chunk Nation Legislature approved the Office of General Council Establishment & Organization Act and the Family Wellness Court Code. We also passed a quick passage procedure to the ERA regarding the grievance process. We adopted amendments to the Charitable Request Act. The Legislature enacted the Title Recording & Transfer Ordinance.

The following items are out for 45-Day Public Comment: Eviction Ordinance, Debarment Process Act, Amendments to the Probate Code for Non-Trust Property, Amendments to the Probate Code for Trust or Restricted Property, and the Per Capita Distribution Ordinance.

The candidate names for the next Tribal Elections have been released and we have primaries on March 7. Be sure to get out and vote on March 7th.

The Legislature established a restricted account for the North American Indigenous Games.

The Legislature passed a resolution that opposed disturbances to burial-effigy mounds and sacred sites and gave authorization to start governmental relations regarding this issue.

District 5 Representative Robert TwoBears was ap-

pointed as a representative to the IHS National Tribal Budget Formulation Team. District 2 Representative David Greendeer was nominated to serve on the Federal Communications Commission's Broadband Deployment Advisory Committee.

The Ho-Chunk Nation authorized a gaming compact contribution to the Lyndon Station Fire and Rescue Department.

There is an upcoming Ho-Chunk Nation Sponsor Night with the Wisconsin Badgers on Sunday, March 5, 2017 at the Kohl Center in Madison. There will be a viewing party in Madison for the game for those unable to attend the game at the Kohl Center.

Pow wow dancers practice their moves at 'Pow Wow Dance Hour'

Dance has always played a significant role in Native American culture. Throughout the years, tribes have used it in religious ceremonies and healing rituals. But at some point in its history, Native American dance became better known for the role it plays in competition pow wows.

So to help her fellow tribal members improve upon their dance skills for future competitions, jingle-dancer Cassie Hindsley holds what she calls 'Pow Wow Dance Hour' at the House of Wellness in Wisconsin Dells every Tuesday and Thursday night.

"We dance whatever style we want to dance," Hindsley said. "It just depends on what you're feeling."

The first dance sessions took place in 2015 at Hindsley's home, and any other

place that she could secure a spot. However, as attendance began to increase, Hindsley soon realized that she had to find a more adequate arrangement.

"We eventually asked (the House of Wellness)," Hindsley said, "and (started) saying where it was at."

At first, her participants consisted of mostly friends and family members. But it didn't take long before word got out and the numbers grew. Now, with up to 20 people attending every session, the program finds itself in full swing.

"It's going on its second year," said golden-age dancer Vickie Hindsley. "I like it because it's helping me. I lost two pounds. It's helping me lose weight where I never lost (it). I was at an even weight for about two years. But it also helps me get my stamina

going." Dancers of all ages are welcome to attend. At any given session, Hindsley sees kids as young as six and – on the other end of the age spectrum – elders well into their golden years.

"There's a lot of kids that are dancing," said chicken-dancer Lennox Lasley. "When we first started dancing, we started at a different age. And as we got older, everybody just thought it was about money. Then people were telling me that you don't win for the money. You win for the people that are sick and can't dance, and (for those) that are gone now. So you let them know you're dancing for them."

The program is free to all participants, both tribal and non-tribal. So far, though, no one outside of the tribe has attended a session yet. Hindsley hopes that will soon change.

"People want to learn," Hindsley said. "And they ask me. I'll show them what I know. But it's up to the person themselves to know what style they want to dance. I can teach what I know. That's all I can say."

Those interested in attending a session need not apply, register or anything like that. Anyone who wishes to join merely needs show up at the House of Wellness on Tuesday or Thursday night at 7 p.m. The Hindsleys hope to see you there!

U.S. Mint honors Native American effigy mounds with new quarter

A part of native culture was honored nationally with the newest release in the "America the Beautiful" quarter series.

The quarter, featuring Effigy Mounds National Monument in eastern Iowa, officially launched to a crowd of more than 1,000 on Wednesday, Feb. 8, at the Waukon High School in Waukon, Iowa.

Iron Mound Drum Group, a Ho-Chunk traditional drum group, provided the music and the combined honor guards of the Andrew Blackhawk American Legion Post 129 in Black River Falls and the Sanford WhiteEagle American Legion Post 556 in Baraboo provided the presentation of colors.

One of the speakers and honored guests was Edmore Green, tribal chairman of the Sac and Fox Nation of Missouri in Kansas and Nebraska. He represents one of the many tribes that have a cultural association with Effigy Mounds.

"It's very wonderful that we can come here and you can understand the essence of this coin and the essence of the effigy mounds. So that you can understand, especially our young people here, you can understand that we were never discovered, we were always here," Green said.

Green said that the mounds were built 2,000 years ago and are still present to this day. He had been to Effigy Mounds National Monument over the past couple of years to discuss the coin's design and the meaning and significance.

With the issuance of the coin, people will be reminded of the efforts, compassion and empathy toward humankind, he said.

"It's important to know the history," he said.

The coin design, created by artist Richard Masters, displays an aerial view of two bears and one bird effigy mound. Masters, an Iowa native, has now designed four images of the quarter series. He currently resides in Wisconsin and is an associate professor of art at the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh. He is part of the U.S. Mint Artistic Infusion Program.

The mounds are part of the Marching Bear Group in the south portion of the nearby

Effigy Mounds National Monument.

The ceremony was emceed by news anchor Ron Steele of KWWL, Waterloo, Iowa, and included remarks from Philadelphia Mint Plant Manager J. Marc Landry and other local officials. Representatives from the offices of Congressman Rod Blum and Senators Charles Grassley and Joni Ernst gave brief congratulations at the event.

Additional highlights of the launch ceremony included a recorded video message from Peggy Whitson from aboard the International Space Station. She is a native of Mt. Ayr, Iowa, and she is NASA's most experienced female astronaut, now a part of Expedition 50, which is a program that extends from late October 2016 until March 2017.

"When you see the effigy mounds, you have to wonder if it was meant to be seen from above, and what the mound builders thought about standing next to those mounds and looking up," Whitson said. "It's not only part of the past, but also it reminds us of the bigger picture of life – what is beyond the horizon," Whitson said.

"The effigy mound builders were inspired to think about things larger than themselves and the mounds continue to this day to have the same effect on those who are lucky enough to visit this amazing site," she said.

Effigy Mounds National Monument Superintendent Jim Nepstad thanked Green, the members of the Iron Mound Drum Group and the members of the Andrew Blackhawk American Legion Post 129.

"You honor us with your

presence here today, and your presence here speaks volumes about your continuing connection with the land of your ancestors," Nepstad said.

There's a sense of awe and wonder about the dedicated people who created these mounds, Nepstad said. Imagine making a bear mound that is 100 feet long. Imagine the amount of soil that needed to be moved – all by hand. This was a process that was repeated hundreds of times. Persistence pays.

"Tens of thousands of mounds once dotted the landscape, but most of them were destroyed. Mounds are located in the whole area of Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota, with the majority being in southern Wisconsin. So why is the Effigy Mounds National Monument in Iowa? It's because of people like Ellison Orr, who worked tirelessly for creating the park. It took decades to put the park in place. In 1949, when Truman was president, Iowa residents made it happen."

Ellison Orr was active in promoting the idea of protecting the cultural and natural resources of northeast Iowa. He played a key role in the eventual creation of Effigy Mounds National Monument, and, after its creation in 1949, he donated most of his writings and much of his American Indian artifact collection to the national monument.

Nepstad said that the National Park Service works with many tribal nations, and that many of them have the word "waukon" in their vocabulary. It means sacred or mysterious.

He said that he hoped the issuance of the quarter would encourage people to come and visit the Effigy Mounds National Monument.

"Get out there, get inspired, and once you're inspired be persistent," he said. "Good things will happen."

Mark Landry of the U.S. Mint spoke about how the mounds quarter is the first of five to be released in 2017. With the release, many people may want to learn more about the Mounds National Park and its history.

"It embodies the sacred landscape," he said.

Landry said that, with the release of the Effigy Mounds quarter, Americans will see the quarter and want to learn about the national monument and learn more about the people who built the mounds. The people who built the mounds held the land and the mounds as sacred places and sites.

"The design of the quarter embodies the spirit of the sacred landscape, depicting an aerial view of three mounds in the Marching Bear Group," he said. "This new coin honors a special place where ancient people changed the landscape of their world in a most extraordinary way."

The main reason is for preservation and protection of the sacred mounds, said Pierre

"It will help perpetuate the Ho-Chunk way of life and have embodied into a coin. It's important," Decorah said.

Waukon is a Ho-Chunk family name, plus the name of the Waukon High School athletics name is the Indians, he said. The Ho-Chunk people were nomadic and lived in the whole region of Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin.

Marlon WhiteEagle also was part of the color guard and he said just being there had positive effect for the Ho-Chunk people and Native Americans in general.

The Ho-Chunk drum group and color guard were the only organized Native American groups at the event.

"It's probably the only time most of the people present have ever had contact with Native Americans and the only time they have heard native songs," WhiteEagle said.

"I enjoyed the event and so unaware of the presence that the Ho-Chunk history

that needs to be educated and rededicated in our ancestral lands surrounding areas besides just Wisconsin," said Donald Greengrass, a member of the color guard.

"The Waukon Iowa community and state were so thankful for our attendance that I think the Nation should start an Effigy Mound Powwow in conjunction with the National Parks Service to reintroduce our cultural heritage to our Iowa neighbors and caretakers of our ancestors," Greengrass said.

Immediately following the ceremony, \$10 rolls of the new quarters were available for exchange at tables in the entryway of the gym.

All children age 18 and younger received a free Effigy Mounds quarter provided by the U.S. Mint. Additionally, students in Kindergarten through fifth grades received the redesigned Effigy Mounds National Monument Junior Ranger badge, which incorporates the new America the Beautiful design as well.



The combined honor guards from the Andrew Blackhawk American Legion Post 129 and Sanford WhiteEagle American Legion Post 556 presented the eagle staff and flags during the ceremony.

New program to opens doors to the entertainment world

When Corey White hits the stage, his talent as lead guitarist with the band Kalliah and the Blackwater leaves little doubt that the man knows his music.

His knowledge of entertainment goes way beyond what he offers when he is on stage.

Officially launched about a month ago, White now offers training for businesses and agencies to book their own nationally-known entertainers.

White is the owner of CRW Productions, a Minneapolis-based business that books national entertainers for venues such as Native American casinos. It's this behind-the-scenes work to bring a

over 10 years developing a program in-house. He booked all the performances for three casinos, creating programs and outdoor concerts.

"When he first started, he used buyers like me but he is one of the few, if not only, Indians that I have ever met who has figured it out in the job and has skipped third-party buyers," White said.

When requested to go to a particular site, White begins to investigate the needs of that business and what is available as resources. He then builds a custom program for that business and tailors the training manual for that purpose.

"I, myself, and two other trainers go to that property for two to three days, depending

on how

many staff members we're training, and we put them through the process," he said. "Even while we're training, we will book national acts with them. I'll sit right next to them on the phone and say, 'My buddy Michael, this is so-and-so from Royal River Casinos. Would you mind

charge." For example, a casino had a million dollar budget for entertainment. Out of that \$1 million, they're spending a minimum of 10 percent paying a company to book those shows. So, they're making more than \$100,000, he said.

He has global databases of what each artist has been paid, ticket sales history, full addresses agents, phone numbers management, record labels, and email addresses.

White has been booking entertainers for years and has developed a knowledge of what can be obtained and for what price.

"As an example, we want Kelly Pickler on such and such a date. I call Kelly Pickler's agent, and I get a price. Now, when I get that price, I'm Ho-Chunk, I have this deep care to make change, and also I'm a hustler. The second I hear \$80,000, I tell people before I even get the 's' out on the dollars, I say \$35,000 and they go 'What?'" White said.

"I never make my counter offer even half. I insult them by going lower than half. Then I say, 'That's all I have. Can we make it happen?' he said. "And see, what we're doing is empowering, But you see, anyone can do that. You can do that right now. There's no smoke and mirrors thing. I'm opening up the curtain. I'm going, 'look it.'"

Ninety percent of the casinos in the country have companies like White's CRW Productions, although his is the only Native American one. He wants to share the skills he has gained with other Native Americans through his training program.

"We're talking millions and millions of dollars in fees combined. And even the Ho-Chunk Nation itself has spent, over the 20 years experience, probably millions of dollars in fees to these agencies. We don't need them," he said.

"I've been to all the conferences and I know all my competition and they all know me - all the national agencies that I compete with. They all do these presentations at NIGA (National Indian Gaming Association) conventions, at Great Plains Indian Gaming and at reservation conventions. It's the same couple of companies that do all the entertainment stuff, they pay big sponsorship fees, so they're plugged in," he said.

"They're good business people. But what they stand up there and they say is, 'Well, what you need is someone with experience, years and years of relationships with national agencies and national artists,' and they make it seem like it's some untouchable thing. Thing is - if we take our wallet away from them, those people don't want to talk to them, they're not friends. Whoever has that wallet. My 8-year-old can book any concert in 45 minutes," White said.



White makes the entertainment industry his business, booking performers by day, and playing guitar and singing at night with the band, Kalliah and the Blackwater.

He admits that he's abrasive and condescending sometimes because he's done this for so many years and he's to the point where he's good at his profession.

"I'm really, really good at this and my competition knows that I'm the only Indian who does this at their level. And they also know I'm about to cut their legs out from beneath them by showing everyone in Indian Country how to do this. Which, may be working me out of a job, but this isn't my job," he said. "I want to create some change and this is a great opportunity for me to create hundreds and hundreds of Indians like myself across the country."


He can't guarantee that the people he trains will do their job properly, but he does offer support. If the trained people quit and those people are gone, White will come in and

book the shows for the casino until they can get someone new and not paying fees.

"It's about the opportunity for tribal members to experience different things. If we stand in front of the General Council and we say, 'Who all here wants to be a Blackjack dealer? Who all here wants to book the concerts?' And the whole room has no idea they can do it. We've let one or two people convince us for 20 years that we're not capable," White said. "When is it Indian Country's turn to develop these same relationships?"

The educational experience he is offering is about empowering people, he said.

"They know they can do the jobs at the casino, but if the casino burns down, you can go anywhere in the world if you have these kinds of tools," White said.

performance to the audience that is his livelihood, with his knowledge spanning several decades.

Expanding that knowledge, White has begun a new venture by publishing his book, Guide to Booking National Entertainment, which is used as a how-to guide in the entertainment industry.

He's offering an educational service so that businesses can book their own entertainers and save thousands of dollars in the process.

"I've written the book. And when I say that I wrote the book on it, it means I wrote the book," White said. "It's taken over three years and 24 years of my experience. I've had this idea since I started working with Ho-Chunk Gaming - Black River Falls six years ago."

It's a program, offered by White and two other trainers, all Native American. They help train people to work as agents to book speakers and entertainers for casinos, concert halls, clubs, weddings, seminar and other speakers, and even churches.

One of his trainers for the educational course spent well

sending them a price list? I'm just here to introduce the two of you.' And that's it."

If you want the book, it'll cost you five figures to buy the book, he said. He'll have casino managers ask him how much for the book and he'll answer, "\$10,000."

"What? For the book?" they'll ask me. Yes, this is 15 to 20 years of my experience and a really qualified staff. This is not like anything on the planet," White said.

The 20-page custom manual is left at each business for future reference. Also, each participant is automatically enrolled in the Native American Talent Buyers Network, which allows members to communicate with each other, sharing information and empowering them, he said.

The bigger companies he's been talking to have recommended him to sell his services at \$80,000 to \$120,000.

"At the end of the day, it's hard to convince Indian Country we're not in this to get rich. This program runs between \$15,000 to \$25,000," he said. "Compare that to the one-time fee of \$100,000 per year most other agents



Notice is hereby served to all eligible voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation that the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board, in accordance with the Constitution of the Ho-Chunk Nation has called a General Primary Election. **ARTICLE VIII – ELECTIONS** and the Election Code (2 HCC Sec. 6), states in relevant part:

3. Elections, c. Primary Election and Runoff Elections.

(1) Primary Elections shall be held prior to an Election with three (3) or more candidates in order to ensure compliance with the majority vote requirement as provided for in paragraphs 1c and 1e, above.

(2) If no candidate in any Primary Election receives more than 50% of the votes cast in such Election, the two candidates with the highest vote totals from the Primary Election (and any candidates) tied with the lower of such totals) shall appear on the ballot in the Runoff Election. When there are two (2) seats vacant in a district, the top two (2) vote getters for any vacant seats, if no candidate has received 50% + 1 vote, shall be on the ballot for the General Election or Runoff Election. (3) Primary Elections shall be conducted in the manner prescribed by this Code and in accordance with the timetable adopted by the Election Board.

ELIGIBLE VOTERS:

Any enrolled member of the Ho-Chunk Nation who is at least eighteen (18) years old and who has resided in their respective district for at least three (3) months. See *Election Board Code Sec. 11 (c)*.

REGISTRATION:

Each person seeking to vote must register at the polling place. If a person cannot write, that person must sign his/her name with a mark before two (2) witnesses. A Ho-Chunk translator will be available to assist any tribal member who requests assistance.

ELIGIBILITY DISPUTES:

Any individual whose name does not appear on the eligible voters list can claim the right to vote by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board. Any eligible voter may challenge the eligibility of an individual's name appearing on the eligible voters list by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board.

The Election Board will rule on all written challenges to the list of eligible voters immediately after the close of the challenge period. Section 11(c) iii, (Deadline Thursday, February 16, 2017).



POSTING ELECTION RESULTS:

The Election Board will certify and post the official election results within three (3) days after the date of election.

CONTESTING OF ELECTION RESULTS:

Any member of the Ho-Chunk Nation may challenge the results of any election results within ten (10) days after the Election Board certifies the results. The Trial Court shall hear and decide a challenge to any election within twenty (20) days after the challenge is filed in the Trial Court.

ELECTIONEERING:

There will be no electioneering within fifty (50) feet of any polling places.
