Office of the General Council Official Quarterly Report

Good morning members of the General Council and Legislative Branch

The Office of the General Council is hereby officially submitting the Quarterly Report to satisfy the provisions set within the Office of the General Council Establishment & Organizational

November 2023:

- During the latter part of October 2023 a packet for two (2) Budget Modifications were sent
- forward to be addressed within the month of November.

 a. Internal Budget Modifications Approved by Legislative Finance Commission Motion.

 b. True Increase Approved by Legislative Resolution 12.05.23A

 The Office of the General Council submitted a third Budget Modification on November 13, 2023 for a True Increase to obtain Legal Counsel. This Budget Modification was denied by a Legislative Finance Commission Motion on December 1, 2023.

1. On December 4, 2023 the Legislative Finance Commission was sent official notification to inform the Legislative Branch and the Legislative Finance Commission that their action in the way of a motion to deny a proposed budget modification for the General Council Branch during the December 1, 2023 Legislative Finance Commission Meeting appears to be an unlawful act according to the legal language within the Ho-Chunk Nation Appropriations and Budget Process Act 2 HCC § 4:

6. Budget Modifications

(1) The Office of General Council may perform budget modifications as a means to control spending and preserve the appropriated budget Any budget modifications will be detailed as to line item and subject to periodic review from the Legislative Finance Commission

shall be approved by the Finance Commission.

- 2. They were also notified of our request for the Ho-Chunk Nation Legislature and the Ho-Chunk Nation Finance Commission to take corrective actions According to the Ho-Chunk Nation Appropriations and Budget Process Act 2 HCC § 4:
 - 9. Enforcement and Penalties. The penalties assigned the violations herein are mandatory and in addition to discipline administered under the Nation's employment law.
 - a. Enforcement and Imposition of Penalties.

(4) Legislative Branch.

(a) Violations of this Act by a Legislator shall be deemed a violation of fiduciary responsibility and subject that official to sanctions under the Nation's Code of Ethics Act

(b) The Vice President shall enforce the provisions of this Act for employees within the Legislative Branch and impose the penalties provided by paragraph b, below.

b. Penalties

(1) Executive Directors and Enterprise General Managers and their subordinate supervisors having responsibility for formulation and execution of a budget shall be subject to the following penalties for violations of this Act.

> (a) For a first violation of this Act the individual shall be placed on probation and shall for procedural violations pe required to take correction action within thirty (30) days of the notice of the violation and probation.

> (b) If the violation has not been corrected within thirty (30) days or if there is a subsequent violation of this Act within ninety (90) days, the individual shall be terminated

- (2) Employees of the government and enterprises other than those identified in paragraph (1), above, shall be subject to discipline, to include termination, as provided by the Nation's

This Budget Modification was to allow the Office of the General Council to secure the adequate funding for a full-time General Council Attorney.

- The Department of Justice was also notified through Attorney General Gardner for the purposes of enforcement of 2 HCC § 4:
 - c. Prosecution by the Attorney General.

(1) As legal counsel for the Nation, the Department of Justice shall prosecute all violations of this Act promptly whenever:

(a) On the basis of any information available to him or her, including receipt of information from any person, the Attorney General has reason to believe that any person is in violation of any provision of this Act and the appropriate official has not the required disciplinary action; or

(b) The Chair of the Finance Commission requests prosecution after the Commission has conducted a preliminary inquiry and has reason to believe a violation of this Act has occurred and the required disciplinary action has not been taken.

(2) The Attorney General or his/her designee shall not exercise

 Lastly on December 21, 2023 the Office of the General Council received a memorandum dated December 20, 2023 that was to Vice President Karena Thundercloud and the Finance Commission's Presiding Officer, Legislative Representative Kristin White Eagle from the Ho-Chunk Nation Attorney General William Gardner. It was in RE to <u>Office of General Council</u> Notification of potential Appropriation and Budget Process Act violation - DECISION
It appears that the Attorney General may have exercised prosecutorial discretion with his decision to not prosecute the complaint. The Ho-Chunk Nation Judicial Branch was not given the opportunity to hear this complaint and afford the Legislative Branch to respond according o normal legal procedure. Instead it appears that Attorney General Gardner offered his own legal responses within the memorandum. This would normally be done by the detendant's legal counsel in the form of a response during a court proceeding, usually not by the prosecuting

- January 2024:
 1. On January 2, 2024 a request was sent to the Office of the President President Jon Greendeer for the Official General Council 2024 Meeting call.
 - Then on January 15, 2024 the Office of the General Council received the Official Call for the 2024 Annual General Council to be set for September 21, 2024
 - Immediately after receiving the Presidential Call the Office of the General Council began the Request for Proposal processes regarding a venue
 - Kohl Center Madison WI, was the first to respond with an unfortunate update that the date would not work for them. Their RFP has been recorded.
 - Alliant Center Madison WI, was the second to respond with great news that this date
 is available and has been in correspondence to meeting requirements and is hoping to have enough information in the near future to send us a proposal.
 - Kalahari Wisconsin Dells WI, also responded with great news that this date is available and they will be sending their proposal in the next few weeks.
 - 4. Once a venue is secured we will be able to begin the process for all of the other vendors

"Odie (Orlando Ike) and Cher (Laubmeier) were really supportive throughout the process," said Tindall. They allowed the use of the backroom of the Ho-Chunk Nation Madison Branch Office for the project.

The canoe was on display while community members ate a potluck dinner. Shaya Schrieber from the school district said an art teacher

would like to store the canoe after completion.

"Here in Madison, it's rare if we get opportunities to experience our indigenous culture and this is one of those rare and precious times," said Tara Tindall.

Gene Delcourt provided a brief explanation of the canoe-making process. "This is a birch bark style canoe and very little of it is traditional material," Delcourt began. Continued on Page 9





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Indigenous Peoples' Day now an official paid holiday in Dane County

Dane County has joined a small handful of counties throughout the country that recognize Indigenous Peoples' Day as an official paid holiday after the Dane County Board of Supervisors approved an ordinance amendment codifying Indigenous Peoples' Day.

There are 11 federally recognized tribes in Wisconsin and the land that would later become known as Dane County is located on the ancestral and traditional lands of the Ho-Chunk, Sauk, and Kickapoo nations.

The Board also approved a resolution celebrating Indigenous Peoples' Day, the second Monday in October.

"For over 200 years, our country has honored Columbus Day as a holiday in some shape or form. Today, we recognize that the narrative around Columbus is inaccurate. I was in inspired when four states began to celebrate Indigenous Peoples' Day instead, showing respect and honor to our original people. Then I was further motivated in 2018 when the City of Columbus officially ended its celebration of Columbus and recognized this new holiday. A year later, Wisconsin dropped one holiday for the other," said County Board Supervisor Rick Rose (District 16) in

a press release. "I'm glad that in 2024 we are doing more here in the first county in our state to make the day an official holiday. We are recognizing

that we live on original Ho-Chunk land and their history and heritage is a vital part of Dane County life."

face smiling, proud and happy."



Bald Eagle Watching Days Take Flight Feb. 10 In Sauk Prairie All Events Are Free And Open To The Public

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) invites the public to participate in the rescheduled 38th annual Bald Eagle Watching Days happening on Saturday, Feb. 10, in Sauk Prairie. All Bald Eagle Watching Days events are

free and open to the public.

Bald eagle lovers can watch eagles soar above the Wisconsin River from a newly renovated overlook located at 490 Water St. in Prairie du Sac. Volunteers will be available at the overlook to help visitors spot eagles and answer questions from 8 a.m. – 4 p.m.

Visitors can also enjoy live raptor shows in the River Arts Center of the Sauk Prairie High School featuring educational birds and trainers from the Schlitz Audubon Nature Center in Milwaukee, a screening of a recently recorded rehabilitated bald eagle release with live expert Q&A session and more family-friendly activities. Full details are available on the Ferry Bluff Eagle Council website.

"These events offer unique opportunities for people to come together to celebrate the success of bald eagle recovery and conservation in Wisconsin," said Sumner Matteson, DNR avian ecologist.

Active bald eagle nests can be found in every county of Wisconsin. Bald Eagle Watching Days celebrates eagles as they gather in winter areas, providing fantastic viewing opportunities as eagles from northern Wisconsin, Canada, northern Michigan and Minnesota move south in search of food. Raptors looking for fish typically congregate along

the Wisconsin, Mississippi and Fox rivers, where their growing presence has turned the sites into birdwatching destinations and inspired many community events.

The event is co-sponsored by Ferry Bluff Eagle Council, the Sauk Prairie Area Chamber of Commerce, the Wisconsin DNR and Tripp Museum in Prairie du Sac.

Eagle Watching Tips

The best time to see foraging eagles will be in the early morning (8-10

a.m.) as they depart their nighttime communal roosts to feed along the river and two hours before dusk as they return to their roosts.

When viewing eagles at these events or on your own, biologists advise onlookers not to venture too close as it will cause the eagles to fly off. Watchers are also encouraged to stay in their cars unless they are at a staffed viewing site.


Mr. Twinn shot a lot of monster bucks throughout his hunting years, but this is by far his biggest buck ever.



Top Ten Consumer Complaints Reported to DATCP in 2023

MADISON, Wis. - As the state's primary consumer protection agency, the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) receives tens of thousands of requests for assistance and resources each year. In 2023, DATCP received and responded to more than 10,000 written consumer complaints, with mediation and enforcement settlements resulting in over \$3.3 million returned to Wisconsin consumers and deposited in the general school fund from civil forfeiture payments.

"DATCP staff do incredible work protecting Wisconsin consumers from concerns ranging from simple transaction disputes to scammers and identity thieves," said DATCP Secretary Randy Romanski. "I want to thank the entire Consumer Protection team for their commitment to promoting a fair marketplace through conflict mediations, investigations, and their efforts to proactively educate consumers."

DATCP's top ten complaint categories in 2023 were:

1. Landlord-Tenant Issues

Landlord-tenant issues were the number one complaint filed with DATCP in 2023. Consumers filed 2,208 complaints when disputes between landlords and tenants could not be resolved between parties, a slight increase from the previous year. Common issues reported were security deposit returns, eviction, unauthorized entry, inadequate disclosures, and unsatisfactory service. Additionally, DATCP received more than 60,000 visits to landlordtenant consumer resources found on its website, including the Landlord-Tenant Guide

DATCP received 1,276 telemarketing complaints in 2023, a slight decrease from 2022. These complaints concerned robocalls, phishing and spoofing, imposter scams, and $\underline{\text{Wisconsin Do}}$ Not Call Registry issues. Last year, DATCP joined the Wisconsin Department of Justice (DOJ), the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), and agencies from all other 49 states and the District of Columbia in the $\underline{\text{Operation Stop Scam Calls}}$ initiative to crack down on illegal telemarketing operations responsible for billions of unwanted calls to U.S. consumers. This resulted in a lawsuit against a company that allegedly sent or transmitted approximately 157 million calls to Wisconsin phone numbers on the National Do Not Call Registry.

3. Home Improvement

Home improvement concerns accounted for 867 complaints in 2023. The top issues consumers reported include failure to provide services and materials, failure to honor warranties, deceptive and misleading representations, poor quality of work, billing disputes and incorrect charges, improper installation, and failure to properly disclose lien waivers. DATCP contributed to the federal investigation into Tyler and Jennifer Hansen, who pleaded guilty in 2023 to multiple charges related to home improvement businesses they ran together which stole over \$800,000 from Wisconsin consumers

DATCP received 642 complaints regarding telecommunications services in 2023, down slightly from the previous year. Consumers reported issues including billing disputes, disconnections and terminations of service, deceptive and misleading representations, refund and adjustment policies, and failure to cancel services when requested. Consumers should carefully read their contracts and policies to understand the extent and limitations of the services they are purchasing.

5. Identity Theft

With 459 complaints in 2023, reports of identity theft to DATCP decreased last year. Online account takeovers were the most common issue reported by consumers. To protect themselves against this risk and avoid the hassle of automated, sometimes unhelpful account recovery services, consumers are encouraged to create unique passwords and activate two-factor authentication for their important online accounts. Victims of identity theft should contact DATCP right away and keep in close communication with their DATCP consumer protection experts to recover and protect their identity against further fraud.

Complaints related to medical services decreased slightly from 2022, with consumers filing 380 complaints in 2023. The most common issues reported to DATCP include billing disputes, deceptive and misleading representations, and unsatisfactory service.

Returning to DATCP's top ten list with 352 complaints reported in 2023, the number of complaints in this category more than doubled compared to 2022. Consumers reported issues such as failure to perform requested repairs, delays in service, poor quality of work, deceptive and misleading advertisements, overcharging, and charges for work not performed.

This category covers a variety of issues including motor vehicle rentals, airlines, hotels/motels, and travel company service bundling. DATCP received 255 travel complaints in 2023. Billing disputes, refund and adjustment policies, failure to return deposits and payment, and unsatisfactory service were commonly reported by consumers.

9. Motor Vehicle Sales (New and Used)

The ninth most common consumer complaint in 2023 concerned sales of both new and used motor vehicles, about which DATCP received 233 complaints. The most common issues cited in these complaints were inadequate disclosures, deceptive and misleading representations, and violations of prize notice and direct-mail marketing laws.

10. Motor Vehicle Accessories

DATCP's tenth most common consumer complaint category of 2023, having received 185complaints, was motor vehicle accessories. Common among these complaints were reports of deceptive and misleading advertising, refund and adjustment policies, defective products, and failure to deliver products.


He explained that he read a book and watched tutorial videos to figure out how to craft a canoe.

They used marine-grade plywood. It softens when heated. They soaked the wood for one day and used a clothing steamer to bend the boards. Then, they placed the boards into platforms until the boards cooled. Then, they cut the boards to conform to an oval shape. A polyurethane calk was used to seam the boards

together. Parachute cord was used to lash it. Then, the tale was added. The school district purchased cedar wood to make up the ribs. However, they kept breaking. Ash wood replaced the cedar wood. Pine boards made up the inner lining. Four screws were placed for carrying the canoe.

Youth and Odie painted images on the canoe. The handprints were the signatures of the youth.

Tara Tindall then presented youth participation awards to Kyen



Schreiber, Carter Byinton, Gabriel Christner, and Elias Heimlich. Those not in attendance and were mentioned were Devin Starr and Landyn Morris. Adults who also received an award were Shaya Schreiber, Rachel Byington, and Forest Smart.

DNR, DHS Issue Updated Safe Fish Consumption Guidelines

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR), in partnership with the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS), today announced the online publication of the 2024-2026 Choose Wisely booklet, which outlines guidelines for safe fish consumption.

Fish are full of important nutrients like omega-3s and are a great source of lean protein, however, they may also contain pollutants from their environment and the food they consume that can cause health risks for humans.

To address this, DNR fisheries staff routinely sample fish from areas with suspected pollution or contamination as well as from heavily fished areas. Based on the levels of contaminants found, like polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), mercury and perfluorooctane sulfonate (PFÔS), experts are able to determine the amount of fish that is safe to consume over a person's lifetime to avoid negative health impacts.

We test for contaminants in fish from a number of locations each year and use those new results, along with past testing, to update the advice for those newly tested waters," said Sean Strom, DNR environmental toxicologist. "It's important for anglers who frequently eat fish to be aware of advisory updates."

This updated version of the Choose Wisely booklet identifies new advisories for Wisconsin waterbodies that have either elevated or decreased levels of contaminants, including:

- Removing of PFOS-based guidance for Black Earth Creek (Dane County) and the mercury-based guidance for Kentuck Lake (Vilas County) based on additional monitoring which showed consistently low enough levels to rescind the advisories
- Adding a PFOS-based advisory for the Hat Rapids Flowage on the Wisconsin


River (Oneida County)

- New PFOS-based consumption advice for all species in the Moen Chain of Lakes (Oneida County)
- Modifications to consumption advice for certain species of Lake Michigan fish
- Adding a PFOS-based advisory for the La Crosse River from Angelo Pond to the Neshonoc Dam, including Perch and Neshonoc lakes (Monroe and La Crosse counties)

The DNR encourages the public to follow the safeeating guidelines outlined in the Choose Wisely booklet to reduce the risk of exposure to unwanted contaminants.

"When you follow Wisconsin's fish consumption advice, you are still able to enjoy the many health benefits from eating fish while limiting your contact with contaminants that can build up in them," said Dr. Sheryl Bedno, DHS Chief Medical Officer for Environmental and Occupational Health.

The star-studded lineup of speakers and presenters includes hip-hop artist

Christian "SupaMan" Parrish (Apsáalooke Nation), actor Kiowa Gordon (Hualapai), visual artist Tomás Karmelo Amaya (A:shiwi/Ralámuli/ Yoeme), and Netflix star Charley Hogan (Navajo) from the breakout hit "Frybread Face and Me."

"I am always so inspired by both the speakers and youth attendees at our conferences,' said Mary Kim Titla, UNITY executive director. "The cultural sharing and education that happens here shows that there's a bright future ahead for our communities.'

The event opened with a rousing keynote address and performance by Christian "SupaMan" Parrish, who spoke about challenges he overcame as a child while living on the Crow Reservation in Montana. Youth participants spent much of the conference in breakout sessions focusing on environmental, wellness, cultural, and mental health advocacy. Continued from Page 10 Tribal Touch" Martinez (Diné/ Navajo), Senior Director of Live Presentation for the Phoenix Suns and Mercury, got the morning started and pumped up the crowd for the keyhote presentation by Kiowa Gordon who plays Deputy Jim Chee on AMC's Dark Winds. Youth attendees then participated in 40 speed workshops focused on career, education, health, and culture. The popular round dance event — featuring an Intertribal round dance as well as the O'odham Cu:dk round dance closed the day's events.

The conference ended with Native youth leaders, elected by their peers, showcasing their advocacy plans to better their communities. One group called on youth and adults to work together to clean up their communities, which can lead to a cleaner environment and cleaner water. The advocacy breakouts were led by highly skilled trainers well-known in Indian Country, including Lovina Louie (Coeur d'Alene/Colville/Nez Perce), Tommie Ghost Dog

(Burns Paiute/Oglala Lakota), Eileen Crocker (White Mountain Apache), and J'Shon Lee (White Mountain Apache).

Throughout the weekend, several colleges, Native artists, and Native-focused organizations participated as exhibitors. The San Manuel Band of Mission Indians was the presenting sponsor for the conference. Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation sponsored lunch, the Seminole Tribe of Florida and Gila River Indian Community were champion sponsors. Other sponsors included ASU, Agua Caliente Band of Cahulla Indians, APS, Apache Tribe of San Carlos, Chicken Ranch Rancheria Me-Wuk Indians of California, Daughters of the American Revolution, Freeport-McMoRan, Marquez and Melanie Quintero, Red Lake Nation, and San Pasqual Band of Mission Indians.

DNR Seeks Tips On Illegal Elk **Shootings In Jackson County**

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) needs the public's help in ongoing investigations into the illegal harvests of two cow elk in separate events in Jackson County during the 2022 gun deer season.

DNR staff received and responded to a mortality signal from a cow elk's monitoring collar on Sunday, Nov. 20, 2022. The elk was found on private property near Whitney Road in the town of Knapp. DNR staff received a second mortality signal from another cow elk's monitoring collar on Tuesday, Nov. 22, 2022. DNR staff found the second elk near the Castle Mound and Brockway Roads in the town of Brockway.


Necropsy tests confirmed each animal had been shot. The deaths of


two breeding cows are losses to the elk population growth. The DNR issued a call for tips when the investigation first began in late 2022, however, the information provided thus far has been inconclusive and more information is needed.

No tip is too small. You can share tips of any kind by calling the DNR's confidential violation hotline at 1-800847-9367 or by submitting online.

Elk were reintroduced in Jackson County starting in 2015. DNR staff work with partner agencies to support a robust elk population. This includes collar monitoring of mortalities and location data of calves and adults.

CHIA PUDDING WITH WILD RICE

Adapted from recipe by Indigenous Dietitian Rachel **Dickens**

Ingredients:

- 2/3 cup cooked or leftover wild rice
- 1/3 cup chia seeds
- · 2 cups milk of choice
- · 1 Tablespoon maple syrup or other
- Optional: Pinch of salt, vanilla, cinnamon or other spice
- For serving: berries or chopped fruit, any kind (try frozen berries in the winter), chopped nuts or seeds


Steps:

1. Divide the chia seeds and milk between 2 bowls or jars. It will be 2.5 Tablespoons of chia seeds and 1 cup of milk in each bowl or jar. Mix well.

- 2. Add 1/3 cup of wild rice, 1/2 Tablespoon of maple syrup, and if using a pinch of salt, cinnamon and vanilla to each bowl or jar. Mix well.
- 3. Cover the bowls or jars and refrigerate at least 4 hours, or overnight. If using frozen berries for topping, add them now.
- 4. Check the consistency of the pudding. If too thick, add more plant milk. Add any desired berries, fruits, nuts or seeds to the pudding and serve!
- 5. Keeps in the refrigerator for 3-4 days.

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NOTICE AND RULES OF SPECIAL SECRETARIAL ELECTION

FRIDAY, APRIL 5, 2024



Notice is hereby served to all eligible voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation that the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board is calling for Secretarial Election:

Article XIII of the Constitution provides: "Section 1. Requirements. This Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of the qualified voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation voting at an election called for that purpose by the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board, provided, that at least thirty (30) percent of those entitled to vote shall vote in such election.

- (2) The Election Code (2 HCC § 6); and
- (3) Article XIII of the Constitution provides: "Section 2. Requests for a Secretarial Election. It shall be the duty of the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board to call and hold an election on any proposed amendment to this Constitution at the request of two thirds (2/3) of the entire Legislature, at the request of the General Council, or upon presentation of a petition signed by thirty (30) percent of the eligible voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation."
- (1) All Secretarial Elections will be administered by the Election Board.

Article XIII of the Constitution provides: "Section 2. Requests for a Secretarial Election. It shall be the duty of the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board to call and hold an election on any propose amendment to this Constitution at the request of two thirds (2/3) of the entire Legislature, at the request of the General Council, or upon presentation of a petition signed by thirty (30) percent of the eligible voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation."

AMENDMENT ONE:

To amend Article II Section 1(d) to read as follows:

ARTICLE II- MEMBERSHIP Section 1

HCN Constitution Reads:

"(d) Beginning the date of this amendment is approved, the Ho-chunk Nation shall no longer consider or accept for enrollment any person who has previously been enrolled as a member of another Tribe (including the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska)

Proposed change to the constitution: unless such person was enrolled in the other tribe as minor and later relinquishes such membership or other extenuating circumstances (as determined by a committee of elders duly appointed as provided by law) exist."

Voters will be asked a Yes or No question. A "yes" vote will be in favor of the amendment. A "no" vote will be against the amendment, and to leave the Constitution unchanged.
