Ho-Chunk Candidate Raises Concerns After Campaign Sign Removed by Police

Kaili Berg A Ho-Chunk Nation candidate running for re-election says a tribal member was left confused and frustrated after one of her campaign signs was removed from their yard by a police officer in Black River Falls.

Phyllis Smoke, who is running to retain her seat as District 1 Seat 1 Legislator, shared the incident online that a tribal member found her campaign sign removed from their yard, with a handwritten note left behind citing a "state law" requiring signs be taken down within seven days after an election.

The note referenced Wisconsin's Trans 201.16, which governs the display of political signs related to state elections.

"Of all the things happening in our communities, why would they put so much attention on a small yard sign?" Smoke wrote. She added that in all her years, she had never seen a sign removed in this manner and stressed that the election is still weeks away.

The Ho-Chunk Nation General Election is scheduled for June 3, 2025, with absentee ballot requests due by

May 24. Smoke posted a photo of the handwritten note left behind by the officer, which reads:

"Per State Law Political signs need TO BE removed 7 days after election. Call PD if you have questions."

In a statement provided by Police Chief Travis Brown, the department confirmed the incident and clarified that it was the result of confusion following a separate complaint.

According to Chief Brown, the department had received a report about lingering Donald Trump signs still being displayed beyond the allowed timeframe. Officers were then instructed to remove any signs that appeared to violate the state's political signage laws.


One officer mistakenly believed the Ho-Chunk campaign sign was


related to a local school board race and removed it under that directive. The sign was not confiscated but left on the property next to the residence along with a note explaining the rule.

After learning the sign was related to an ongoing tribal election, Chief Brown personally visited the elder tribal member, apologized, and confirmed the sign could remain in place.

"I advised the elder tribal member it was a mistake," Brown wrote. "I also advised this was not intentionally done to show any disrespect to the sign, what it represented, or any specific tribal member. I told the elder tribal member that if the sign was put back up it would not be bothered again."

The sign has since been restored to the property.





Strengthen Our Sovereignty! Part 6

Sow your Seeds with Care

It's time!!!!! Whether you order from seed catalogs, go on-line, find some at Walmart, or find some from last year, it's time to put the seeds in! Conventional wisdom for Garden Zone 4B says we should wait until June 1 because the threat of frost (going below 32 degrees at night) has not yet passed, but May 15 is only two weeks ahead... and if your gamble of two weeks pays off, you'll get to harvest earlier.

SEED SELECTION

What do you want to grow? It's no fun if you don't plants a whole bunch of favorites.

You can even go by theme! You could grow a tea garden, herb or cottage garden, or even a pizza garden. It's especially fun if you have kids around, and you tap into their imaginations on how you might do a certain theme. If they pick a pizza garden, you might not be able to grow the sausage or pepperoni, but you could grow paste tomatoes and herbs for the sauce, maybe some onions, perhaps green peppers. Everything pizzas are great!

Maybe you like the thought of fairies in your garden. Tiny blooms and plants that make shelters are fun. You can make fairy houses out of old tea kettles, a mismatched boot, coffee can, or other odd junk treasure in your house. You can even make the little fairy yards look nice with flat rock sidewalks, although you might find a matchbox wheelbarrow along the way. If it's nice enough in a good part of town, you might even get a few little people who would like to stay for a while. Treat the little people like you would any guest by offering some food and drink when they get there, or you may find that you have some missing keys or a phone you just cannot seem to find.

My husband gets a kick out of growing potatoes. When they are ready, he'll pull the plants out and start digging for the buried treasure! It's so amazing after a season of growing, how many potatoes can be produced. (OK, maybe we don't get out much in your opinion. Whatever! It's our fun!)

Potatoes remind me that if you have some potatoes that are getting a little old and they've sprouted eyes, it is possible that you might be able to grow a potato plant from that eye. There are several foods (always better if they are organic) where you can start a plant by using the leftover cutting, like celery, scallion, ginger, lettuce, sweet potatoes, bean sprouts, peppers, root vegetables, cabbage, or (for the seriously adventurous) a pineapple! Check the internet for more kinds of plants that can be grown this way. If you don't have the cuttings or not enough of them, you can usually go to your local garden center to get seed potatoes or onions...

GOOD SOWING PAYS OFF

The first consideration is to be sure that you do not plant any seeds ahead of their scheduled planting times

After you have properly prepared and leveled off your soil, you are ready to start sowing. Get a good strong cord, as long as the longest row in your garden. With a one foot stake ties at each end. Use this cord, pulled taut, as a guide in laying out rows that are straight. I'm more of a Darwinian gardener, so I tend to plant in not-so-straight rows and long live the fittest.

But as a beginning gardener, you ought to follow the instructions on the seed packets. I did that in my first years, and it worked pretty well. If there are no directions, go to the internet! (Seeing a pattern here? The internet has a LOT of information on gardening.) We are all supposed to follow the instructions on the seed packets faithfully. If the directions say plant the seed one inch deep, then make your furrow one inch deep. To make a furrow, use a small stick or the handle of a hoe or rake. For deeper furrows, use the corner of your hoe. If the grower says to plant the seeds two inches apart, then do that

Larger seeds like peas or beans, can be placed in the furrow one at a time. If the seeds are very tiny, cut a small piece off the corner of the envelope and tap the seeds out gently, just a few at a time.

KEEP SOME DISTANCE BETWEEN ROWS


Keeping row closer together than what is recommended only cases crowding and the inevitable loss of the plants, soil, and time. When rows are too close together, it is impossible to cultivate them properly as the plants grow. Cultivating the soil is a weekly scratching of the soil surface. Under crowded circumstances it is possible for a row of larger plants to completely cover a neighboring row of smaller plants, either killing or preventing the latter from maturing.

Now, having said this, you may have heard of the three-sisters planting (corn, squash and beans) and may wish to try it. This is how our ancestors in their long-term wisdom coordinated this symbiotic relationship. Go ahead. I personally have had quite the time trying to coordinate the planting times to make a successful group grow. With three sisters planting, the stalk provides structure for the beans. The squash helps with moisture retention and the dead leaves provide good mulch, and the beans help add nitrogen and other nutrients to the soil. I figure our ancestors did a lot of thinking through millennia to come up with this mutually beneficial combination. By the way, I heard a lecture partly hosted by our own Department of Agriculture. The speaker talked about how prior to corn being so popular, the Ho-Chunk may have used sunflowers as the structure to support the beans. Just some food for thought.

FILL IN AND TAMP

After your seed is in, take up the guide cord and fill in the furrow to a point slightly above the level of the surrounding ground. Next, with your hoe temp the earth down gently but firmly. Remember that too much pressure at this time is worse than none at all. Those little seeds have to bust through that dirt! Keep careless feet from trampling upon your hidden seeds by placing a spare stake at both ends of the row, and LABEL THE STAKE SO YOU KNOW WHAT YOU PLANTED. Mystery plants are only fun so long as you don't mind the guess work. I couldn't really appreciate it, especially when I started, but I have gotten better at identifying seedlings.

DNR Seeking Tips On Illegal Elk Shooting

BLACK RIVER FALLS, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) needs the public's help to gather information on the illegal killing of a bull elk in Jackson County.

DNR staff received and responded to a report of a dead elk on the morning of Tuesday, March 18. The elk was located off East Snow Creek Road and on private property north of the city of Black River Falls where department staff were conducting elk capture efforts to radio-collar and relocate a small group of elk.

Following a necropsy to investigate the cause of the mortality, it was determined the bull had died from injuries sustained from a gunshot wound.

The bull, known as #244, was wearing a GPS radio collar which, along with nearby cellular trail cameras, has provided investigators detailed information related to the illegal shooting.

This bull was one of the last remaining elk originally brought from Kentucky in 2016 and has served as one of the primary breeding bulls for the Central Elk Herd.

"The illegal shooting of bull 244 is a tremendous loss for the central elk herd and citizens of Wisconsin. The illegal harvest of a bull of this magnitude reduces opportunity to the hunting

community and to recreationalists attempting to photograph or see elk within Jackson County," said Christina Kizewski, central elk herd biologist. "Bull 244 was one of the largest and most photographed bulls in the state and has contributed to the successful growth of the newly established herd through his breeding efforts."

The DNR asks the public to share any information – no matter how small it may seem – with the DNR's confidential Violation Hotline online or by calling 1-800-847-9367.

No other information is available currently as the investigation continues.

DNR Announces Milkweed As 2025 Plant Species Of The Year

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) announces milkweed as the Rare Plant Monitoring Program's 2025 Plant of the Year and encourages planting milkweed to help monarchs.

Milkweed is an important plant for monarch butterflies and a beautiful addition to any home garden. When combined with a few native plants that bloom throughout the spring and summer, your garden can support an even wider variety of pollinators.

Of the 13 native milkweed in Wisconsin, five are listed as endangered, threatened or special concern. Showy milkweed (Asclepias speciosa) is the state's only nonnative milkweed.

"Monarch butterflies face several major threats, including habitat loss, pesticides and climate change," said Jay Watson, DNR insect ecologist. "Planting milkweed can help create habitat for monarchs, other butterflies and bumble bees."

Monarchs breed in Wisconsin throughout the spring and summer, and they need milkweed to survive. It's the only plant that monarchs lay their eggs on, and it's the only food

that monarch caterpillars eat. Once a monarch reaches adulthood, they may still use milkweed for nectar, but a variety of native plants that bloom from spring to fall are also important.

In late fall, monarchs migrate south to Mexico, where they overwinter in tight clusters. Each year, scientists estimate monarch populations by how much space they occupy, measured in hectares, while overwintering. While 2024-2025 numbers found 1.79 hectares up from .99 hectares the prior season, both are part of a decades-long decline in their population.

The Rare Plant Monitoring Program is a group of trained volunteers who work with the DNR to locate, record and update the presence of rare plants throughout the state. The plant of the year becomes a focus for volunteers who can request rare milkweed surveys and contribute to a statewide status update on these species.

Honor the treaties. These three words are on posters in tribal offices, on the side of buildings throughout Indian Country in the form of street art, on the backs of Indian people thanks to Steven Paul Judd and others that have printed the words on T-shirts so that we can make simultaneous political and fashion statements, and most importantly these words, honor the treaties, are in the forefront of our thinking given the new Federal policies.

Let's be clear, we've seen this before. The dog whistle may have a more fevered pitch, but we've been through this before and each time we've persevered as people because the generations before us were able to lead us through the changing environment. From small pivots to bold shifts, our elders navigated the policy landscape and steered us to survival and eventually to a place where we can

This place, this platform we've built through Indian Gaming and self-determination that has amplified our ability to create a vibrant middleclass in Indian Country, is undeniably under attack. The time for pivots and bold shifts is upon us once again. We need to reduce our reliance on the federal government by recommitting and by doubling down on building and expanding our own tribal economies. I believe there are three pillars for tribal economic sovereignty: Iron-clad Governance, Diversified Business Portfolios, and Capacity

The Economic Sovereignty Triangle Governance To accelerate the growth of our economies we

will need to attract outside capital. Our businesses and institutions need to reflect the principles of strong corporate governance. Smart money follows smart governance. Period. Investors need certainty more than they need opportunity. I've consulted with hundreds of businesses, and none—zero—put capital into jurisdictions where the rules change with political winds. This isn't optional; it's table stakes. Aspects to consider include the following:

Transparency and Stability: Investors are going to want clear, consistent tax, regulatory, and contract enforcement policies. These reduce uncertainty and perceived risk.

Separation of Politics from Business: Investors do not want the strategy and focus of a company to change with the political winds. They want professional management that is not hampered by bureaucracy and instability.

Defined Business Structures: Tribes may use entities like tribally chartered corporations, state LLCs, or section 17 corporations for example. Clear laws and bodies around business structures can provide tax advantages while ensuring clear operational guidelines for businesses.

Access to Investment-ready Projects: Investors require projects with well-developed plans, proper appraisals, and demonstrated capacity to execute. Communities that address limited infrastructure, leadership capacity, and project scale can improve the prospects of successful ventures.

Alignment with Long-term Goals: Governance should align investment projects with community priorities such as economic self-sufficiency, sustainability, and job creation as opposed to shortterm goals or campaign promises.

Disclosure Standards: Tribes can improve access to capital by adopting stringent disclosure policies

No matter where you fall, advancing these aspects will help create an environment where investors feel secure in deploying capital while respecting community sovereignty and goals.

Fire Destroys Tank Creek Bridge Along Great River State Trail; Bridge Closed Until Further Notice

Cause Of Fire Under Investigation

TREMPEALEAU, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) today announced that the Tank Creek Bridge on the Great River State Trail is currently closed until further notice due to damage from a fire on Thursday evening, May 15, 2025.

There were no injuries reported but unfortunately the bridge is a total loss. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

The bridge was originally built in 1957 as a railroad bridge for the abandoned Chicago-Northwestern railroad line and is over 200 feet long and located approximately three miles east of Trempealeau.

Due to the location of the bridge, there is no current reroute in place. A timeline and budget for replacement has not yet been established.

The DNR will be working to address the removal of any bridge debris as safely and quickly as possible. The public should not attempt to access this structure.

The Great River State Trail has 21 bridge structure with over 3,100 linear fee of bridges. Most of these bridges are 100-year-old railroad bridges. The trail is 24 miles long with a crushed limestone surface and extends through the upper Mississippi River valley connecting Trempealeau and Onalaska. The trail connects to the La Crosse River Trail to the south

Tribal IDs accepted during Real ID requirement

Real ID requirements for domestic air travel have been enforced for nearly two weeks. Depending on the airport, passengers without a Real ID or an alternative form identification, like a passport, have been notified to get a Real ID.

The question: is tribal identification still accepted?

The Transportation Security
Administration confirmed to ICT that
"tribal photo identification issued by a
federally-recognized Tribal Nation / Indian
Tribe is accepted by TSA for identity
verification purposes in the security
checkpoint at airports nationwide."

Kristi Noem, Secretary of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, said on May 6 to a congressional panel that those with a passport or a tribal ID "may be diverted to a different line, have an extra step" after the Real ID deadline on May 7.

The TSA website states: "If your ID cannot be scanned by technology, you will be asked for a secondary ID that can be scanned. If you do not have a second ID, your Tribal ID will be inspected manually and cross-referenced with the Federal Register."

The Federal Register uses the same list as the Bureau of Indian Affairs so tribal citizens will need to pay attention to the official name of the tribe on the BIA list. For example, the Mandan Hidatsa and Arikara Nations will be listed as the Three Affiliated Tribes of the Fort Berthold Reservation, North Dakota.

Lauren van Schilfgaarde, Cochiti Pueblo, said that Noem's statement was not an assurance because tribal identification had already been challenged and misunderstood by TSA officials before the Real ID Act. Van Schilfgaarde is an assistant professor of law at the University of California in Los Angeles with research on tribal sovereignty and federal Indian law.

"It is reasonable to speculate that tribal IDs are going to face additional scrutiny, putting additional burdens on Native people where the burden really should be the opposite," van Schilfgaarde said. "Many Native people can anecdotally say, as well as tribes say, that tribal IDs have had far from the uniform acceptance rate pre-Real ID Act and so this appears to be an intensifying critique of tribal IDs."

The Real ID Act was passed in 2005 as federal law in response to the Sept. 11 attacks. The law sets specific requirements for state-issued driver's licenses and prohibits federal agencies from accepting driver's licenses that do not comply with those requirements. Legal names have to be consistent across documents like social security cards and birth certificates.

There has been some opposition from states to Real ID because of the federal government's overreach in state laws and state ID license requirements.

Tribal identification is used to show tribal membership and enrollment and for services like the federal Indian Health Service. Van Schilfgaarde said it's not logistical if tribal identification can't be accepted.

"It is, as a first-order principle, an expression of tribal sovereignty. The ability for the tribe to dictate how tribal *Continued on Page 12*



St. Cloud, Minnesota, the nearest "big town" to our reservation. St. Cloud was big enough to have a Wal-Mart and big enough to have a Blockbuster. My dad would walk in with a couple of pizzas, some snacks, and a bag of videos. James Bond flicks, new releases, and classic films. It was a great time.

Blockbuster was a good company and a great brand...until it wasn't. In 2005 it was on top of the world, the only game in town. And then big tech, namely Netflix (who wasn't that big yet), wiped it out and made it irrelevant. We're in the middle of this very story in Indian Gaming. Big tech, namely Fan Duel and Draft Kings, are coming to eat our lunch and, in many cases, we're letting them straight in through the front door and letting them sit at the head of our tables. It's still a long play for them, the next decade or so, but let's not kid ourselves.

There are other attacks. State legislatures, billionaires, and state agencies are looking in our direction for tax revenue and market destruction. The Adelson family isn't just trying to destroy the Dallas Maverick's basketball team, they are also at the Texas state legislature trying to dictate the fate of many Indian people near their borders. In Minnesota, the state's racing commission expanded gaming without the state legislature, citizen support, or the governor by allowing the state's racetracks to install slot machines in their card rooms. No laws. No public discourse. No regard for what Indian Gaming means to the broader, mostly rural, economy of the state. Just a board of anti-Indians making decisions that will damage countless lives, Indian and non-Indian.

I tell this tale because I don't want us to become Blockbuster. I don't want us to miss the opportunity to pivot, to become irrelevant, to be disintermediated, to disappear.

The pivot we need to make alongside our continued vigilance in protecting Indian Gaming and running world-class facilities is to expand our possibilities. We need to morph from regional gaming traffic generators to regional tourism drivers, healthcare providers, cannabis cultivators, industrial creators, entertainment districts, government contractors, real estate developers, childcare creators, and on and on and on. We need to start more ventures, buy more businesses, and inspire more entrepreneurial capacity.

Nothing. Let me repeat. Nothing is going to produce the way gaming does, and we can't let that deter us. Our metrics should evolve from how much distribution we are generating for our tribes to how much of the gross domestic product in our region we are responsible for. A long-term, sustainable economy requires control of production. The goods and services needed in our regions need to be controlled by us.

Capacity Building

When I grew up, I would frequently go to my grandmother's house to hang out. There were two things I knew for certain when I would go there; there would be a hot meal to eat and there would be a tremendous amount of love shared throughout the house. Because of that, my grandma's house was the catchall for just about everybody loosely related to us. Aunties, uncles, cousins, friends claiming they were cousins. Everybody loved my grandma's house

The certainty of that place. The stability of the love that would be there when you walked in. That is the very essence of capacity building in a strong tribal economy. A quality, affordable, sustainable, and predictable place to call home. We needed them then and we need them now. So does our workforce.

Without proper housing infrastructure we'll continue to see struggling labor forces and poor labor participation. Improving housing will improve our capacity to accelerate the growth of our economies.

We also need to make a bold investment in education to increase the skills of our community members. Education is the most effective lubricant for upward mobility. We're going to get the leadership we deserve in our companies, governments, and institutions. If the vision is still to have intelligent, ethical, and energetic leadership running our tribes, businesses, and key departments it will be up to us to create that intelligence. Nobody is going to do it for us, we must do it for ourselves. Investing in and being creative about upskilling our citizens is crucial.

The Bottom Line

The message couldn't be clearer: In the changing Federal landscape, tribal nations face a binary choice — build economic independence or watch sovereignty slowly suffocate under the weight of dependency.

As Chairman W. Ron Allen put it to me a few weeks ago, "if we say we are governments then act like governments!" The tribes that will thrive in this environment aren't those waiting for federal cavalry to arrive. They're the ones building their own armies.

Economic self-determination isn't just good policy; it's the only policy with a future. The federal-dependency model is terminally ill, and no amount of political optimism will resurrect it. Tribes can either design their economic future or have it designed for them.

Life, business, and tribal sovereignty all follow the same rule: adapt or die. The clock is ticking, and in the immortal words of Darwin, it's not the strongest or most intelligent that survives, but those most responsive to change. For tribal nations in 2025, economic adaptation isn't just a strategy—it's survival itself.

Continued from Page 9 identification is expressed about who tribal members are, but also about what kind of identification is necessary, if any, on tribal lands that is simply an authority that cannot nor should it be delegated," she said.

But there are some tribes that have identification that meet state requirements.

Tribes like the Choctaw Nation of Oklahoma have an all-in-one membership card that can be used as a photo ID and be used for traveling. The Pascua Yaqui Tribe has an agreement with the Department of Homeland Security and Customs and Border Protection that allows their Enhanced Tribal Identification Card for bordercrossing purposes.

Some tribes across the country are encouraging their tribal citizens to get a renewed tribal ID that is TSA compliant like the Native Village of Koyuk in Alaska, Tolowa Dee-ni' Nation in California, and the Muscogee Nation in Oklahoma with their enhanced tribal

However, the Central Council of the Tlingit and Haida Indian Tribes of Alaska is informing their citizens to bring a second form of identification.

A former staffer of the National Congress with American Indians, who won't be identified for fear of retaliation, worked with TSA regarding tribal IDs. They said in their experience flying with their tribal ID, they were never required to go to a different line but they had to maintain the use of a tribal ID without

Aztalan Ho-Chunk Garden Planting

Please join the Friends of Aztalan State Park on Sunday, June 1st as we welcome Hinu Smith, Executive Director of the Ho-Chunk Nation's Agriculture Department as we learn to plant a traditional Ho-Chunk garden at Aztalan State Park.

The program will begin at 12:00 PM (Noon) by the Friends of Aztalan State Park Interpretive Trailer and park shelter located at the middle parking lot.

Hinu Smith will explain the cultural significance of the Ho-Chunk Nation and other heritage seeds and the history of Ho-Chunk agricultural practices past and present.

We invite the public to help us plant Ho-Chunk Speckled Corn, Hubbard Squash, a bean variety (TBD), and a Ruramuri Sunflower (Tarahumara White Sunflower). The Raramuri variety is a variety from Northern Mexico and was gifted to the Ho-Chunk.

Also learn about ancient agricultural practices at Aztalan during the Mississippian Period with educational display boards and ancient artifacts on display such as the Mill Creek Chert Hoe and its significance.

This educational program will be followed by a comprehensive site tour with Aztalan expert Robert Birmingham beginning at





a second form of identification. The experience depended on how familiar the TSA agent would be with tribal identification. Supervisors were usually called and they would cross-reference the tribal ID with tribes listed in the Federal Register per the TSA website.

The source added it's up to the TSA's discretion to accept tribal IDs. There are no statutes or a regulation that allows it.

"I really think that came more from tribal nations having consultations with TSA and pushing policy perspective, especially post-911 to make sure that tribal IDs were accepted by the federal government to get into federal buildings, on planes as well," they said.

The staffer added that tribal citizens using their IDs more will help educate the general public.

"It's a responsibility, particularly of young folks in Indian Country who can and have the time to be able to use their tribal IDs because it makes it easier on our elders and our people who have accessibility or disability issues to come through with their tribal IDs once you've gone through, so utilizing your privilege and knowledge and education in that way," they said.

Van Schilfgaarde said that people who plan to use tribal identification should not panic, plan for extra time and refer the officials to your own tribal office for verification.

"Remember that you do have rights against being detained or answering questions that you are feeling uncomfortable answering, but don't get overly excited," van Schilfgaarde said.

Reward Offered in Missing Person Case

LAC DU FLAMEAU, WI – The Lac du Flambeau Tribe and the Lac du Flambeau Tribal Police Department continue to seek the public's assistance in locating 37-year-old MELISSA BESON of Lac du Flambeau.

The Lac du Flambeau Tribe is offering a reward of up to \$25,000 for information leading to the return of MELISSA BESON and/or the arrest and prosecution of anyone involved in her disappearance. MELISSA's family desperately wants to know where she is, and the Tribe is fully committed to helping its law enforcement agency exhaust every investigative resource to

find her and bring her home.

MELISSA BEŠON is a Native American female, 5'7", with a medium build, brown hair and brown eyes. She has numerous tattoos, including on her neck, arms and legs. MELISSA was reported missing on March 23, 2025. The last confirmed sighting of her was on Monday, March 17, 2025, during the late afternoon. At that time, MELISSA was observed walking on Indian Village Road, near Wayman Lane, in Lac du Flambeau. When last seen MELISSA was wearing red sweatpants, a black sleeveless shirt and gray sweatshirt.

The Lac du Flambeau Tribal Police

Department (LDFPD) remains steadfast I nits investigation into MELISSA's disappearance. Every lead, no matter how small is being thoroughly pursued to find her. Authorities have searched relentlessly in the area in which MELISSA was last seen, as well as other areas of interest. LDFPD Officers and assisting agencies have conducted grid searches on foot, have deployed high-tech drones and airplanes, and have searched using specially trained canines. To date, over 3,400 acres have been carefully searched.

The reward offered by the Tribe will be apportioned as deemed just by

Notice is hereby served to all eligible voters of the Ho-Chunk Nation that the Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board, in accordance with the Constitution of the Ho-Chunk Nation has called a General Primary Election. ARTICLE VIII – ELECTIONS and the Election Code (2 HCC Sec. 6), states in relevant part:

- **5. Elections**, c. Primary Election and Runoff Elections.
- (1) Primary Elections shall be held prior to an Election with three (3) or more candidates in order to ensure compliance with the majority vote requirement as provided for in paragraphs 1c and 1e.

ELIGIBLE VOTERS:

Any enrolled member of the Ho-Chunk Nation who is at least eighteen (18) years old and who has resided in their respective district for at least three (3) months. See Election Board Code Sec. 11 (c).

REGISTRATION:

Each person seeking to vote must register at the polling place. If a person cannot write, that person must sign his/her name with a mark before two (2) witnesses. A Ho-Chunk translator will be available to assist any tribal member who requests assistance.

ELIGIBILITY DISPUTES:

Any individual whose name does not appear on the eligible voters list can claim the right to vote by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board. Any eligible voter may challenge the eligibility of an individual's name appearing on the eligible voters list by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board.

A voter may vote by absentee ballot provided the Election Board receives the absentee ballot request in writing no later than Saturday, May 24, **2025 by 4:00 pm.** See *Election* Board Code, section 13(a), i Requests MUST INCLUDE the eligible voter's name printed or typed (with signature), physical address where the ballot will be delivered (we use UPS next Day Air – UPS Next Day Air will not deliver to a P.O. Box), daytime telephone number and enrollment number.

Absentee Ballots must be received before 7:00 pm on Tuesday, June 3, 2025.

Absentee ballots may be returned by overnight mail, so they may be received at the Election Board Office or the polling places prior to the close of the polls on Election Day. NOTE THAT FEDEX and UPS NEXT DAY AIR DOES NOT DELIVER IN BLACK RIVER FALLS ON SATURDAYS.

POSTING ELECTION RESULTS:

ELECTIONEERING:

There will be no electioneering within fifty (50) feet of any polling places.
