New Election Process Brings Greater Access and Transparency to Upcoming General Election

The Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board is rolling out a new voting process this year, designed to increase participation and transparency in a key constitutional amendment vote during the annual General Council meeting in September.

This special edition of the *Hocak Worak* is meant to ensure that all tribal members are aware of the upcoming vote, which focuses on an amendment that would allow individuals who were enrolled in other tribes as minors, but who meet Ho-Chunk descendancy requirements, to enroll in the Ho-Chunk Nation.

The vote will take place at General Council, and for the first time, members will also have the option to vote by mail.

William Gardner, Attorney General, said the board wanted to get this information out as widely as possible.

"The main point of the special edition is to give as much notice as possible," Gardner said. "We want everyone to know about this new opportunity to vote and how the process will work."

The push to create this hybrid voting process came after a resolution passed at last year's General Council, which called for constitutional amendments to be voted on at the following year's General Council meeting.

That resolution set the wheels in motion for the Legislature and Election Board to develop a system that allows members to cast their votes either in person or through the mail, making it easier for more members to take part in the Nation's decision-making.

In addition to the constitutional vote, the special edition also includes information about a District 1 special election. This election reflects recent redistricting changes, which now include the Minneapolis—St. Paul area as part of District 1.

Attorney Erik Shircel, who advises the Election Board, explained that the new process is possible because of an amendment to Section 21 of the election code.

Under the revised code, every eligible tribal member will automatically receive a ballot in the mail at least 30 days before General Council. These ballots no longer require notarization but must be witnessed by a U.S. citizen at least 18 years old.

For those attending General Council in person, polling stations will be set up at the site. Voting hours will run from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., or two hours after adjournment if the meeting ends earlier.

Shircel also reassured members that election integrity remains a priority. If a member votes by mail but later decides to attend General Council and vote in person, only the in-person vote will be counted. The mailed ballot would be set aside, ensuring no one votes twice.

"This new process gives tribal members who can't make it to General Council an opportunity to still have their voices heard," Shircel said. "At the same time, it

maintains election integrity and ensures no one votes twice"

The change is especially important because amending the Constitution requires approval from at least 30 percent of eligible voters, while quorum at General Council requires just 20 percent.

The hybrid system is designed to close that gap by allowing more members to participate, even if they cannot attend in person.

Looking ahead, this hybrid approach is expected to become the standard for future constitutional amendment votes.

While other pending resolutions, including those on procedural rules, transparency, and governance, are also being discussed, Gardner emphasized that the main focus this year is ensuring the proposed enrollment amendment remains clear and at the forefront.

Tribal members are encouraged to watch their mailboxes in the coming weeks for ballots. Those who plan to attend General Council in person may vote at the meeting if they prefer.

Leadership hopes this new process will make it easier for everyone to have a say in shaping the Nation's future

NCAI Condemns President Trump's Call to Reinstate Harmful Mascot Imagery

Washington, D.C. — In response to President Donald Trump's public threat to block a new stadium deal unless the Washington Commanders reinstate their former name and his demand that the Cleveland Guardians also revert back, the National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) unequivocally opposes any effort to revive racist mascots that demean Indigenous communities. Since 1950, NCAI's priorities have included the eradication of harmful, unsanctioned Native "themed" mascots and propaganda.

"Any attempt to distract by invoking our names and purporting to speak for our communities is an affront to Tribal sovereignty and is not taken lightly. For seventyfive years, NCAI has held an unbroken voice: Imagery and fan behaviors that mock, demean, and dehumanize Native people have no place in modern society. NCAI will continue to stand in support of the dignity and humanity of Native peoples," said NCAI President Mark Macarro.

In May of this year, NCAI Executive Director Larry Wright, Jr., responded to a mascot-related decision by the Department of Education, noting "our youth deserve to see themselves treated with dignity, not as punchlines or cartoonish relics of the past. The continued defense of these mascots is a refusal to confront racism. Enough is enough."

In July 2020, NCAI commended the Washington Commanders for "eliminating a brand that disrespected, demeaned, and stereotyped all Native people." In July 2021, NCAI commended the Cleveland Guardians for "[taking an] important step forward in healing the

harms its former mascot long caused Native people, in particular Native youth." Our position and that of Indian Country broadly — rooted in unanimously passed resolutions reflecting the perspectives of hundreds of Tribal Nations — has not changed.

Tribal governments have been outspoken and unambiguous on this issue for generations. Contrary to President Trump's assertion that "[o]ur great Indian people, in massive numbers, want this to happen," Indian Country has repeatedly come together to condemn the unsanctioned use of harmful Native "themed" mascots, particularly those which sexualize, stereotype, or dehumanize American Indian and Alaska Native people.

Conditioning federal policy or development deals on the revival of racist language contradicts the government's responsibility to uphold tribal rights and dignity, threatens the integrity of lawful governance, and opens the door to further discriminatory policy demands. We are not your mascot. We are not your distraction.

HO-CHUNK NATION ATTORNEY GENERAL OPINION

REGARDING PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE HO-CHUNK NATION

Introduction.

On September 21, 2024 the General Council met and passed a resolution for a Secretarial Election. ¹ The resolution advances an effort to amend the Constitution of the Ho-Chunk Nation (hereinafter "Constitution"). If passed, the amendment would permit enrollment by persons who were previously enrolled in other Indian Tribes when they were minors, as long as they meet all other Ho-Chunk membership blood quantum and DNA requirements.

After the Office of General Council provided the resolution to the Election Board, it was verified that a majority of voters at the General Council voted for the Constitutional Amendment.² Following its' April 6, 2025 meeting, the Board referred the proposed amendment to the Attorney General for an Opinion relating to the constitutionality and legality of the proposed amendment. Once this Opinion is given, it is to be posted in the Nation's newsletter for two consecutive printings, along with the text of the proposed Amendment.³

Text of the Proposed Amendment.

The Resolution seeks to amend Article II, Section 1 of the Constitution of the Ho-Chunk Nation by adding the following language to said Article II, Section 1:

(e) Beginning the date this amendment is approved the Ho-Chunk Nation will permit the enrollment of persons at least 18 years old, who were enrolled in another Tribe as a minor child, to enroll with the Ho-Chunk Nation upon relinquishment of enrollment in that other tribe. The Descendant must meet all other qualifications as identified in Article II, Section 1 of the Ho-Chunk Nation Constitution.

Opinion.

- 1. The proposed amendment was adopted by a quorum of the General Council and was properly certified by the Election Board. It is *procedurally lawful*.
- 2. The proposed amendment is also *constitutionally* sound.
- 1 The Ho Chunk Nation Election Code 2 HCC§ 6.21 now refers to this as a Constitutional Election.
- 2 Resolution 09.21-24G. The Resolution passed by a vote of Yes 928, No 562, Abstain 135. for a total of 1,625 votes. The quorum number was 1,261.



Gov. Evers Blasts Trump Administration Over Blocking \$72 Million for Wisconsin's Kids and Schools

MADISON — Gov. Tony Evers today blasted President Donald Trump and the Trump Administration over efforts to withhold more than \$6 billion for K-12 school districts across the country, including over \$72 million for Wisconsin's kids and schools that the state was expecting to receive. These critical funds support the state's K-12 kids and schools and technical colleges through after-school and summer programs, English-learning programs, educator trainings, and more.

The governor's lawsuit comes as the U.S. Supreme Court yesterday issued a devastating decision to allow the Trump Administration to resume disastrous mass firings at the U.S. Department of Education—a move toward ultimately dismantling the agency—adding continued stress on Wisconsin kids, schools, and other facets of the state's and country's educational system that rely on federal support.

Earlier this month, Gov. Evers announced Wisconsin was joining a multi-state lawsuit challenging the Trump Administration attempting to cut funding already approved by Congress to help support critical mental health services in Wisconsin's K-12 schools and higher education institutions, jeopardizing millions of

dollars for Wisconsin kids' mental health over the next several years.

Gov. Evers today released the following statement regarding the new lawsuit against the Trump Administration targeting tens of millions of dollars for Wisconsin's kids and schools:

"President Trump and the Trump Administration's war on kids and schools continues. From the get-go, this administration has done virtually nothing to help support Wisconsin's kids or our schools, instead attacking Head Start Programs, trying to dismantle the Department of Education, and attempting to gut millions of dollars to help support our kids' mental health.

"America's kids and schools depend on these critical resources and services. These reckless decisions are deeply concerning to me as a governor who's also a former educator—but they also alarm me as someone who's the grandparent of nine grandkids. President Trump and the Trump Administration must stop messing with our kids. Period.

"I promised I'd fight every effort by President Trump and his administration to mess with our schools, our kids, and their futures, and I will continue to keep that promise."





DNR Offers Universal Recreation With Outdoor Options For All

MADISON, Wis. – The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds the public that Wisconsin's state parks, forests and recreation areas offer a variety of universal recreation options available across the state. These include equipment available to borrow, such as adaptive kayaks, all-terrain wheelchairs and beach wheelchairs, and amenities such as accessible fishing piers, universal play areas and barrier-free accessible cabins for camping.

Public lands are communal spaces that provide relaxation, physical activity and socialization opportunities. Universal recreation opportunities ensure that all visitors have access to the physical and mental benefits of outdoor recreation and spending time outside.

July is Disability Pride Month and the anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act, a federal civil rights law passed in July 1990 that prohibits discrimination against people with disabilities in everyday activities. The DNR is committed to providing exceptional outdoor recreation opportunities for people of all abilities around the state during Disability Pride Month and year-round.

Many state properties host adaptive equipment for outdoor recreation. The DNR's adaptive equipment fleet includes adaptive kayaks, beach wheelchairs, motorized and nonmotorized outdoor wheelchairs, cross-country sit skis and beach access mats. Locations where adaptive equipment is hosted can be found on the Adaptive Equipment webpage.

Park conditions can change, and adaptive equipment is added or moved at properties throughout the year. Visitors interested in using equipment should call the property before their visit to ensure the equipment or accessible features are available.

To locate properties with accessible amenities and equipment, visit the Find A Park webpage and add a filter for "Accessible Features and Services."

Universal recreation equipment and amenities provide opportunities for the entire family to recreate outdoors together. Features like universal trails, benches and barrier-free access paths to play areas create safer, more user-friendly spaces for all visitors, including parents with strollers, elderly individuals and those recovering from injuries.

Join DNR staff and partners for Universal Recreation Day at the Kettle Moraine State Forest – Pike Lake Unit on Sept. 6, 2025, near the North Shelter. This drop-in event will have activities for visitors of all ages and universal recreation equipment to try out. Launch a paddlecraft from the property's new universal kayak launch, explore using a motorized

or nonmotorized outdoor wheelchair, cool off using a beach wheelchair or take a short hike down the newly installed boardwalk trail.

Federal Budget Reconciliation Bill "Devastating" to Wisconsinites' Access to Health Care, Food Assistance

On Friday, July 4, the president signed the budget reconciliation bill (the One Big Beautiful Bill Act), which will increase red tape for FoodShare and Medicaid members and will force 270,000 Wisconsinites to lose health insurance by taking away necessary support for them to afford health care coverage. Gov. Tony Evers

and Wisconsin Department of Health Secretary Kirsten Johnson released the following statements:

"Republicans' vote to cut popular programs like Medicaid will have a devastating impact on working families, kids, seniors, and Wisconsinites across our state. Wisconsinites will lose access to their health

care and basic necessities like food that people depend on every day—and all so Republicans could pay for tax breaks for wealthy millionaires and billionaires. Make no mistake: the people of Wisconsin and our state will not be better off because of this bill," said Gov. Tony Evers. "My administration will use every tool we can

to respond to these cuts and we will continue doing everything we can to make sure every Wisconsinite has access to quality, affordable health care and the basic necessities they need to survive and thrive."



During a heat stroke, the body loses its ability to cool down, rising to dangerous temperatures that can cause permanent damage or even death. Some medications can make it harder for your body to regulate temperature and become more susceptible to overheating on hot days.

Signs and symptoms

Notice is hereby served to all eligible voters of District 1. The Ho-Chunk Nation is calling a Special Election which will be held due to the Resignation of Legislator Rodney Rave, District 1, Seat 2 effective July 11, 2025. The Ho-Chunk Nation Election Board, in accordance with the Constitution of the Ho-Chunk Nation will conduct a Special Election. ARTICLE IX< SECTION 10, Removal, Recall and Vacancies and the Election Code 2 HCC Sec. 6, states in relevant part:

ARTICLE IX-REMOVAL, RECALL VACANCIES

Section 10. <u>Vacancies in the</u>
<u>Legislature</u>. If a vacancy occurs in the
Legislature because of death, mental or
physical incapacity, removal or recall
vote, resignation, felony conviction, or
for any other reason, such vacancy
shall be filled in the following manner:

(a) If three (3) months or more remain before the next General Election, the Election Board shall call a Special Election in the appropriate District to be held within thirty (30) days.

NOMINATIONS OF CANDIDATES

The official candidacy forms may be obtained from the Election Board Office. A candidate for elective office shall submit an Official Nomination Petition, Declaration of Candidacy and a \$5.00 filing fee by hand delivery or U.S. Mail to the Election Board Office before the close of the nomination period on Wednesday, July 23, 2025 by 4:30 PM. ORIGINAL FORMS MUST BE SUBMITTED. FILING BY FAX OR COPIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTABLE.

ELIGIBLE VOTERS:

Any enrolled member of the Ho-Chunk Nation who is at least eighteen (18) years old and who has resided in their respective district for at least three (3) months. See Election Code Sec. 11 (a) (b).

REGISTRATION:

Each person seeking to vote must register at the polling place by showing identification before receiving an Official Ballot. If a person cannot write, that person must sign his/her name with a mark before two (2) witnesses

ELIGIBILITY DISPUTES:

Any individual whose name does not appear on the eligible voters list can claim the right to vote by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board. Any eligible voter may challenge the eligibility of an individual's name appearing on the eligible voters list by presenting a written challenge to the Election Board.

The Election Board shall rule on all written challenges to the list of eligible voters immediately after the close of the challenge period, Section 11. c. *ii*. (Deadline, Tuesday, July 22, 2025).

ABSENTEE VOTING:

A voter may vote by absentee ballot provided the Election Board receives the absentee ballot request in writing no later than **Wednesday**, **August 6**, **2025 by 4:00 P.M.** See *Election Code*, *Page 26*, *Sec. 13 (a) (i)*.Requests MUST INCLUDE the eligible voter's name printed or typed (with signature), physical address where the ballot will be delivered (we use UPS next Day Air – UPS Next Day Air will not deliver to a P.O. Box), daytime telephone number and enrollment number.
